## A MILLION IMMIGRANTS

It is estimated that in the twelve months ended with June about 1,000,000 immigrants flocked to the American continent, points out the St. Thomas Times. If they brought with them on an average of \$10 apiece and that is a moderate estimate—they added \$10,000,000 to the money supply. In May the influx was 145,000 persons, an increase of 17 per cent. over 1907. The year makes a new record, exceeding even the figure for 1882, when 789,000 came over. Not a few of the newcomers settled in the Atlantic coast region, but it is believed that the great majority went West to speed the development of that section. Perhaps ten per cent. of the immigrants came to Canada, either direct or through the United States. That is a small proportion, but it will grow year by year.

To take these people West—if all had gone West—would require 20,000 passenger cars, to say nothing of baggage and freight cars for their belongings. It has been supposed that the incoming foreigner competed with native American labor and kept down wages. But wages have seldom been higher than now. In fact, our foreign-born workers, with their habits of subordination, support their unions very faithfully in fights for higher wages and appreciate an improved income as much as anybody. There are, indeed, kinds of employment for which the native Canadian or American does not much care, and these fall naturally to the immigrant. But for him not a little difficulty would be encountered in getting certain kinds of work done at all.
