Melancholy Accident.—On Sunday last, Mr. Charles Le Tourneux, a merchant of Belesil, and son of P. Le Tourneux, Eaq., formerly Cashier of the Banque du Peuple, was drowned in the River Richelieu. He had embarked about two o'clock in the afternoon with three other persons on a pleasure excursion in a boat. They had not proceeded an arpent from the shore, when a sudden movement, to shift the sail, caused the boat to capize. Mr. Le Tourneux, the father, was upon the river bank, but in spite of his utmost excitions he could not reach the spot where his son was struggling with the stream, before he had disappeared to rise no more. The shock of losing a beloved child under such distressing circumstances did not preven thim from a successful effor to save two of the unfortunate companions of his child, already feedle in their centext with impending death. The third was found dead underneath the lost, one of his leep being locked within one of the thwats, and his two hands clasping a bor. His name was Eustache Croteau, wnose father was of the party, and one of those saved by the exertions of Mr. Le Tourfeux.

The whole af this latter gentleman's family having assembled on the river bank, to witness the embarkation, were exposed to the agony of witnessing the desperate but vain efforts of Mr. Le Tourneux deceased. He was only 21 years of age—universally beloved and respected. His body was recovered from the water on Monday morning.—Transcript.
