Austrians Balked In An Attempt to Retake Pelagosa

Rome, July 30.—An attempt was made by a squadron of Austrian cruisers and a flotilla of torpedo boat de-Austrian island of Pelagosa, in the Adriatic, which was occupied by the Italian naval forces last Monday, according to an official communication issued to-day by the Italian Ministry of Marine. The attack was repulsed.

The statement adds that some members of the Austrian landing party were forced to swim to their ships. It is officially announced that two prisoners, who were charged with espoinage, were tried by court martial on the 16th and 17th. They were found guilty and sentenced to death.

Additional Marines To Port au Prince

Washington, July 30.-Two Americans of the landing force from the cruiser Washington, were killed at Port au Prince, according to a message from Admiral Caperton, received to-day. The men were members of a patrol and were shot from ambush returned the fire. No further disturbances occurred.

Admiral Caperton reported that the town was attacked from the south at 8 o'clock last night. He had been warned, and disposed his forces of defence and repulsed it. He said there was no cause for alarm. The battleship Connecticut, with 500 additional marines, has been ordered to Port au Prince from Philadelphia.
