## CITY COUNCIL GIVES BY-LAW TWO READINGS

### People Will Vote on \$100,000 for Waterworks Improvements This Year.

The city council met last night and the city hall to discuss the proposed sanction of the by-law necessary to complete the waterworks extension. There was a good meeting with Mayor Spence presiding, and little breezes alternated as the dissentient voices of objection were heard, and then soothed into a silence of acquiescence. City Clerk Leonard read the minutes, and then a communication re the local clubs under civic displeasure from the city solicitor came up for discussion.

**THE LOCAL CLUBS**  
The matter of the Clubs being brought up, Ald. Ryerson moved that a deputation be sent to Ottawa to interview the department in regard to its being sanctioned, as it was nothing less than a gambling den. To this, Ald. Charlton added that the necessity for a deputation was a good case, and to this the Mayor assented, and a memorial will be prepared clearly stating the city's objections, and in the matter of the Athletic and Bowling Association, to appeal to the public.

**WATERWORKS EXTENSION**  
Chairman John Fair of the Waterworks Commission, explained the estimated cost, and that it would mean practically a new system of pipes or a duplicate, and that much could be done by their own men, and the pumping house and pumps by contract. The money now asked for will complete the present installation.

"Money spent before it was voted for," ejaculated Ald. Ryerson, who seemed to require reassurance on the finance side of it. "Not a cent spent that was not necessary," was the rejoinder from the commissioner. Ald. Calbeck wanted to know if it would take care of the Terrace Hill section, and was assured that was one of the objects of the scheme. The laying of the mains would be estimated at \$44,306, and the new pumping station \$39,000. A great many ratepayers have a very definite idea of its necessity, Chairman Fair explained.

Ald. Ryerson got up and was eloquent on the subject, and said he did not think the underwriters of the Board of Health had a right to run the city into the expense and then ask them to vote for it. The Mayor said that he'd rather have the men in the city on that job than walking the streets; it was a necessity to have the work go on. Ald. Charlton thought that all the manufacturers would soon be out on Terrace Hill, and it would have to be tackled sooner or later, and why not now. To this, Ald. Ryerson told a story of the underwriters going, to all the bodies in the city and saying this must be done, and that must be done, and he did not like such dictation.

Ald. Warren said that the people after the prosperous years enjoyed previous to the depression, it would be well received by them. Ald. Calbeck then rose and said he thought it would be a credit to itself with the rise in rates, and he favored it. Commissioner Montgomery represented the Water Commissioners, and entertained the council with some rare reminiscences. With reference to proposed increase, he said it was a necessity to go on with it, the waterworks commissioners and board of health had been told so, and the requirements were as estimated. He thought, therefore, of the Ontario City debtors taken at less than discount, up to January, it was \$619,000 of constructions, with \$44,000 of sinking fund. They had an outstanding debenture list to day of \$355,000. This position, in the council was in good shape, and with this year's work there would be a surplus of \$5,000. When they asked for \$150,000, they had before them the fact that they had required \$70,000, and it was in the interest of the public to complete the work. He gave reasons for this; it would supply water to meet every requirement, domestic and otherwise; also it would increase the supply of the hospital and for use in case of fire direct to the hill from the works. It would be self-supporting, and would not increase the rates after the original vote of \$150,000 was expended, and it would reduce the rates on houses in five years.

Ald. Ryerson took exception to this statement. He said if they took \$600,000 off, they needn't tell him it would not make a difference to the rates. Commissioner Montgomery trenchantly maintained his position, and said he himself would put \$1,000 into it, and if they did not take it up, the commissioners would take it up themselves and put it through it. F. W. Frank, Secretary of Water Commissioners, went into the matter of comparison of the city's rate with other cities and this would compensate the city as the new plant would have double the capacity of any yet installed.

Ald. Broadbent moved, that seeing the necessity of this improvement, that it be carried and the by-law go into effect. The Mayor said the conditions were changed and there were times when they were not comfortable and though they had got through this summer without any typhoid and the Waterworks Commissioners had not spent one dollar without consideration, they had got to have pure water. There was always a certain amount of extension to look forward to and the proposition was to take the water to the outlying sections and previously, all such extensions had been granted. Secretary Frank pointed out that they had lost 25 per cent. on the factories and they had been met by an increase on the house rates. He quite agreed with Ald. Ryerson's contention, but they had acted on the advice of the City Council in spending it. The by-law was then given the two readings necessary for its submission to the electors in January, for their approval.

**"CLUBS" AGAIN**  
"Clubs" again were turned up and the Mayor said if no decision was forthcoming at next meeting, the council will take action to see that no such club can be formed in future and obtain a license, by an amendment of the cities by-law. Ald. Broadbent thought it was wrong for the provincial government to give sanction and charter when the city had objected.

**CITY'S GIFT**  
A committee of the council has arranged for the city's gift. A set of field glasses to be presented to the officers of the contingent now in Toronto from Brantford, and they will leave for this purpose, as the Mayor explained "at his invitation and their expense," on Wednesday, at 10.45. OH, BITTER WAS THE NIGHT. Ald. Pitcher grew heated over the coolness of the council chamber and he would be wiser next night. This little breath of icy winter caused merriment, whereat the council adjourned.

## GERMANS IN TRENCHES SLAIN LIKE RABBITS

### A British Officer Describes Slaughter When His Men Came to Close Quarters.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The following vivid story of a British surprise attack in the early morning on the German trenches is from an infantry officer's letter home: "With A and D Companies we plunged into the thick wood, gradually working our way through it. The Germans were firing into it with rifles and machine-guns, and the bullets were humming through the trees. On getting through the wood we saw we were behind the Germans who were occupying trenches in the open. Then the fun began. We enveloped them, knocking them over like rabbits. Lieut. Hughes and his platoon charged the front. Hughes was killed—shot through the head. His slayer was spitted on a bayonet, and even then he tried to kick the man who had him, but was downed and spitted through and through. Afterwards we found that he was the proud possessor of the Iron Cross. He died gasping. "Two companies of the Somersets also joined us. Between us we got the dead were about the same number. It was funny to see our men picking the Germans out of the trenches, making them high-step away with their hands above their heads and fixed bayonets to their backs. We did not get a single German killed and fifty wounded."

**IS A U. S. SHIP**  
NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—The Sandy Hook marine reporting station stated early to-day that the battleship reported as being off Cape Cod City, on the Maryland coast in the United States ship Kansas. The Kansas, according to the observer, is lying at anchor, awaiting moderation of the weather, and is not ashore, as was believed. The Kansas has reported whereabouts to the Philadelphia naval station.

**HOLLAND TO LEAD**  
ROTTERDAM, via London, Dec. 7.—The Rotterdamse Courant in an editorial, urges Holland, for the future maintenance of the peace of the world, to take the lead in a disarmament proposal, coupled with a proposal for the maintenance of an international army and navy under the control of a judicial court. This would be a world police force to keep the world from menacing it, says the newspaper.

**WERE INSPECTED.**  
MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—AIF of the Montreal units of the second Canadian expeditionary force, and also the McGill battalion C. O. T. C., were inspected to-day on Fletcher's Field by the Prime Minister, Sir Robert Borden.

### SHIP IS ARRIVED

Gifts for War Orphans of Germany and Austria From America.

GENOA, via Rome, Dec. 7.—11.55 p.m.—The American Christian Ship Jason, which arrived here to-day with gifts for the war orphans of Austria and Germany, was stopped by three warships while on her way to this port from Marseilles. The warships, as soon as they learned the character of the vessel and her cargo, immediately drew off, but not before the officers had wished God speed to the Jason and her mission.

When Commander Courtney and other officials from the Jason came ashore, they were met at their hotel by the representative of the German Government, who officially welcomed them and their gifts.

The Jason will begin discharging the gifts on Tuesday. Free transportation of the gifts to the Austrian frontier will be provided by the Italian Government.
