OTTAWA VALLEY PRESS ASSOCIATION

Annual Meeting in the Island City - An Excursion to Clayton

Very few of the newspaper men of the west counties have heard much of the Ottawa Valley Press Association, although it has been in existence several years

The Association was first called into existence by the printers and publishers of the Ottawa Valley finding that some kind of organization was necessary to enable them to meet and compare notes as to prices and rates, so as to avoid the evils of a haphazard system

Last year the Association met at Smith's Falls, and through courtesy, the publishers of Brockville were invited to join, which they did

On Friday and Saturday last the annual outing and business meeting was held in Brockville

Thursday's midday train brought in a number of the members, which was augmented by another contingent on Friday afternoon

It had been arranged through the kindness of the town on Friday morning, but owing to bad train arrangements on the C. P. R., this part of the programme could not be carried out

The local newspaper publishers had enlisted the co-operation of the members of the Board of Trade, and jointly they tendered the visitors a trip through the Thousand Islands to Clayton

Mr. W. H. Constock, with that large-hearted liberality which he so often displays, on his beautiful steam yacht, Albani, at the disposal of the party

At about three o'clock the yacht left Brockville having on board a party composed of Walker, Port Courier; Jas. Ross, Smith's Falls News; Geo. F. McKim, Athens Express; John A. McDonnell, Arnprior Chronicle; Thos. South, Leicestershire; John A. McKenney, Brockville Recorder; N. B. Colcock and B. Lastlaw, Brockville Times; Geo. E. Neilson, Arnprior; Mayor Derbyshire, Ex-Mayor Geo. H. Wetherhead, Councilmen G. T. Fullford, McHenry, McDougall, R. Mathen, and Fred McCready; D. W. Downey, President Board of Trade; John R. Reid, Secretary Board of Trade; H. F. J. Jackson, John McMillan, Col. Gals, J. E. C. O. Lyman, Rob't Wright, W. Broderick; Mr. White, of Trenton; Rob't G. Mole, Arnprior, Wardens of Renfrew County. As the Albani left the wharf amidst a cheering throng, the wharf continued at intervals until Clayton was reached

Capt. Collins did the honors in the place of Mr. Constock, who was not well enough to make the trip in such disagreeable weather, while Capt. Carnegie, of the Island Group, was at the wheel

The steamer drew up to the wharf at Clayton just as the clock chimed the hour of seven

The party were met at the wharf by Messrs. Skinner and McLean, and escorted to the Hubbard House, where they were soon made comfortable

Only a short time elapsed before all were seated in the spacious dining room, fully prepared to do ample justice to the magnificent spread prepared by Miss Kate Hubbard

A beautiful little fountain lay beside each cover, which it is needless to say was eagerly appropriated by each

The intention of the committee of management was to set supper at Clayton and start at nine o'clock on the C. P. R. for Ottawa

But the many beautiful residences of their guests one of the loveliest scenes to be found on this continent, if not in the world

But the familiar saying that "the best laid plans of mice and men gang not aglee," was truthfully

exemplified on this occasion. The party had scarcely left the steamer when a fog arose in the night room so dense that it was found necessary to postpone the departure until later on

Mayor Derbyshire, who enjoys the reputation of being always ready for an emergency, soon had the excursionists collected in the parlor of the hotel, where a couple of hours were spent in speech-making

A number of citizens of Clayton and Mr. Quimby and Capt. Bois, of Albany, joined the party, all vying with each other in their efforts to make the visit of their Canadian friends as pleasant as possible

The usual loyal and patriotic toasts were given and responded to. Finally every one of the party was called upon to reply to some one of the many toasts proposed

John A. McDonald, of the Arnprior Chronicle, filled in the blank spaces with song or recitation. During the supper a large number of "Bought Light and Works" were set off in honor of the visitors

At the first stroke of dawn all hands were called aboard and a start made for Brockville

When the steamer was about opposite Alexandria Bay the sag of the mast was observed and gave a challenging whistle to "come on, Billy"

The engineer did not feel like ignoring a challenge of that kind, so he crowded on steam. For a while or fifteen miles the two boats kept "neck and neck"

Sometimes the Antelope would be a couple of lengths ahead, and then the Albani would forge up and get a few rods ahead

Finally the Albani had to concede to drop out of a couple of passengers at Union Park, and the race was declared off

On reaching Brockville it was decided to hold the business meeting at 10.30 a.m., and on assembling the business was rapidly disposed of

The officers elected for the ensuing year are as follows: Jas. Ross, president; Thos. Southworth, 1st vice-president; N. B. Colcock, 2nd vice-president; G. F. McKim, secretary and treasurer

A discussion took place as to the advisability of extending the scope of the association, so as to include within it all the newspapers in Ontario east to the Eastern Ontario Press Association

The executive committee were instructed to communicate with all the publishers in the territory designated. If favorable responses are returned, the association will meet at Carleton Place on Oct. 25th, for re-organization

A cordial vote of thanks was tendered to the Brockville newspaper Trade and the Town Council for the entertainment provided the members of the association

Messrs. B. Loverin, R. Laidlaw and Geo. E. Neilson were elected members. After adjournment the members of the press from the north were shown through the industries of Brockville by Mr. John R. Reid

The members of the Ottawa Valley Press Association will long cherish pleasant memories of this enjoyable trip
