THE VILLAGE COUNCIL

The regular monthly meeting of the village council was held on Monday evening. All the members were present, the reeve presiding.

The minutes of last regular and special meeting were read and confirmed.

The auditors' report was presented, and on motion of Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Jacob, it was adopted.

It was represented that the council of 1903 had promised to contribute \$15 towards the construction of a fire protection tank on Mill street, and on motion of Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Jacob, this sum was voted for that purpose.

The subject of the town hall was then taken up and discussed at length. The two sets of plans already in the possession of village were carefully inspected and methods of procedure considered, but no definite action was taken other than to decide that a special meeting of the council should be held in a few days for the purpose of consultation.

BELGIANS IN BROCKVILLE

It consisted of a Belgian hare and nine baby hares, only three weeks old. The little ones were surprisingly large, very active, and all possessed the markings that stamped them as being of the blood royal. They were the property of Mr. A. Brees of Fernbank, who is this week making an exhibit of a large number of his choicest Belgians and several pairs of fancy fowls in a store on King street, one door east of Moore & Mowat's. No visitor to Brockville this week should fail to see the exhibit. Interest in the Belgians has been greatly stimulated by a demonstration of the beauty and utility of the fur as a lining for coats and wraps and as a trimming for ladies' wraps when converted into "electric seal." Mr. Brees is exhibiting a coat lined with this fur in its natural dark rufous red color, and also a pet that has been tanned, plucked and dyed.
