THE WATER COMS.

Reorganize for the Year With
Dr. Bray as Chairman.

Outside Plumbers Must Take Out a
\$25 License to Put in Services—(Miscellaneous Business.)

The inaugural meeting of the City Water Commissioners was held last evening in the secretary's office. There were present Dr. J. L. Bray, Wm. D. Sheldon, Mayor T. A. Smith, Secretary J. O. Weir and Supt. E. B. Jones.

Secretary Weir presided during the election of a chairman.

Dr. Bray, the retiring presiding officer, nominated Mr. Sheldon as his successor, but the latter in declining the honor moved the re-election of Dr. Bray, which carried unanimously.

The following accounts were passed: Garlock Packing Co., \$30; Thompson Meter Co., \$56.40; K. C. Burt, \$3.90; Baxter Printing Co., \$1.53; secretary, \$1.25; Watt & Sons, \$11.51. Mayor Smith submitted the following motion:—That in future no claims for refund or rebate of water rate for loss of water caused by frozen or defective plumbing be considered by the water commissioners, unless the claimant proves conclusively that the fault lies to that portion of the work which has been done by the waterworks employees, or has been paid for by the commissioners.

In presenting his motion the Mayor said he thought it was only fair for the rate-payers who were economical and careful in the use of water that they should be protected from the careless and others in adjudicating the claims of the latter.

Mr. Sheldon would not establish a cast iron rule, for where was a real grievance he believed it should be considered. But he believed in placing some such regulation on the books and seconded the motion.

The chairman also spoke in endorsement and the motion passed.

An application for a plumber's license was read from James E. Graves, of Berlin.

The Mayor moved it be not granted. He believed in granting no permits to itinerants.

The secretary said he had prepared a by-law covering the point.

The by-law fixing the purchase of a license by itinerant plumbers at \$25 was then passed.

The Mayor withdrew his motion and moved that the applicant be granted a license on complying with the by-law.

—Carried.

The chairman pointed out that anyone doing work without a license was liable to a fine.

MUST WORRY THEM

Only Way to End the War is to
Tire Out the Boers.

That is Winston Churchill's Opinion
—Cavalry Doing Better Work.

London, Jan. 5.—Winston Churchill sends the following from Camp Frede, dated Jan. 3.—The increased activity of the British cavalry has proved very satisfactory to General Buller. In my judgment this war will not be ended by the capture of any particular place or town, but by the commands in the field getting tired of their losses. The killing of high officials in the Boer army, I believe, is the only sure and certain way of arriving at peace. Ceaseless worrying of the Boers by the British in the last few days has proved very effective. The Boers are becoming more and more discouraged. News has been received of a quarrel between the Free State commandos and the Transvaalers. The Free Staters were taunted with cowardice and departed sulking, but returned later and were conciliated. Two queer traction engine trains appeared to-day, moving with great rapidity over the void, manœuvring and climbing up steep gradients with apparent ease. Doubtless these motors will be of great value in future operations, being capable of drawing heavy supplies anywhere.
