# ECZEMA ON NOSE MAY STAY THERE.

Gunner Shore Has Tempting Offers in South Africa

To Remain After the War is Over-He Writes an lateresting Letter from Fort Munster, Orange River.

Gunner E. R. Shore of D. Battery, Royal Canadian Artillers, writes to Mr. and Mrs. Pinder, under date of Orange River Station, May 3/ as fotlows:

It is so long since I have written you and also so long since I have re ceived any word from you that I do not know if it is my turn to write or not. But as I may be in your debt in this respect, and having a little spare time I think I will write you a line or two. I believe I got a letter from you while I was at Van Wyksblei, but, you while I was at yan wyksolel, out, as I do not know whether I answered it or not I will begin by giving you an account of what has been passing during the time since we left there till we arrived here. We left Van Wyksblei four weeks ago last Sunday, April 4th, for Carnarvon, as the roads were in such a condition that we could not proceed any further up country. We arrived at Carnarvon after two and a haif days' marching. There we stayed three days, and then we started for De Aar, a distance of /a little over 200 miles, where we arrived in seven days, miles, where we arrived in seven days, having marched, since we detrained at Victoria Road, over 550 miles—the longest march of the campaign. We stopped at De/Aar 17 days, and then one section under Lieut. Van Tayl was ordered here. I omitted to say that we travelled from Carnarvon to De Aar via V seburg, a very pretty liftle place of about 500 people. There we found the best water in Cape Colony. From there we went to Da Aar. Before we arrived at De Aar, I expected to see a town fully as large as Chat-ham, but instead I saw a place of about 300 people and about 500 troops If it were not for the railway there ould not be any De Aar. As I said before, after a couple of weeks at De Aar, our section was ordered here, where we arrived on the 1st of May. On arriving here we were ordered t

take up a position ON FORT MUNSTER. erlooking the railway bridge which osses at the Orange River at this int. As it was rather late and our orses were very tired we did not arve at our present quarters till yesterday, Wednesday, morning, May 2nd, pitched camp in the town, or at least where the town will be if one is ever built. About 9 o'clock next morning we proceeded to take up our present position which is reached by a very good road built by the Munsters. It nearly encircles the kopje before the top, which is about 10 acres square, is reached, and the top is covered with small knolls and rocks. The positions our guns occupy are on the side facing the bridge, the north, on a hill about 20 feet high, and very strongly fortified. In fact the whole hill is covered with rifle pits, ridoubts and all sorts of fortifications. Besides our section, which numbers 52 non coms. and men, with our commander, there are about 150 Lancashire Fusiliers, with two Maxims, also stationed on the top The distance from the position occu-

pied by our guns to the near or south end of the fort is 900 yards, and to the far, or north end, 1,350 yards, so that you will see our fort is a very respectable structure as far as size goes, and in regard to workmanship, I do not think I have ever seen better.

The bridge also is a splendid structure. The rails are put in flush with the plank floor on top of a steel frame so as to permit the passage of carriages. The piers are a very curious shape. The piers are a very curious shape, a sort of conical arrangement with one side square and, the other pointed to resist the water. The hill, I forgot to say, is about 200 feet high, and has some very good qualities as far as personal comfort is concerned.

In the first place there are quite a number of small, thick trees, rather like a thornbush, only larger, which give an excellent shade, and then the temperature is very much more even than on the veldt, as the days are no nearly so warm, and the nights ar so warm that it is not necessary lose our tent. As far as rations are oncerned, we get fresh bread and beel every day, with coffee, cocia or tea, and jam. Twice a week we are issued cheese. About the only drawback that we have here is the water, for although there is lot in the river (we bathe every day) yet we have to draw all the water used for wash ing and cooking purposes in our cart and, as for the horses, we have to go at least amile three times a day. But that is not so bad. +

THE HEALTH of all the fellows has been all that could be expected with a few expected exceptions, and as far as I myself am concerned, I never felt better in my life than I do at present. left better in my life than I do at present.
Of course you saw by the papers that we lost one lad by drowning at Van Wyksblei, that is the only death we have had. We go, news of the Ottawa fire through Captain Mackie, our quartermaster, who has large interests in Hull and was cabled by his

we do not have very much work. About all we do is look after our horses, and a fine looking lot they are after all the work they have done. But, as we give them plenty of care, they come around all right in a few days. From the top of our kopje, or where the guns are planted, we can see Belmont with a good pair of glasses on a clear day. But one cannot form much of an opinion of what sort of a place it is from so poor a view. If it is anything like the country around here, it is a wonder how the British

ever accomplished anything.

To-day we are drawing our ration of meat from the cook and are going to fry it ourselves. We have done this before several times and it has proved very successful. We are also having potatoes. So you see, with our bread, we will have a very good meal after all.
