HOLY TRINITY.

Holy Trinity Church was draped in
black yesterday in memory of the
Queen Victoria. The Rev. R. Sims
conducted the services and alluded to
the special prayers at both services to the
late sovereign. The rector also an-
nounced that special mourning ser-
vices would be held in Holy Trinity
church at 11 a.m. next Saturday.

ST. ANNE'S.

The memorial services at St. An-
ne's Church were impressive and ap-
propriate. The pulpit and organ loft
were tastefully draped in black with
union jacks intertwined, also floral
decorations of pure white and deep
red. The music was appropriately
selected and beautifully rendered.Rev. Dr. Bittley in the evening
preached an eloquent and impressive
patriotic sermon. He reviewed the
long and wonderful reign of our late
loved Queen and the higher influ-
ences and Christian consecration
which had made it great. Earnest
eulogy was paid the dead Sovereign,
whose life and reign would live as
an inspiration for future years.

VICTORIA AVE. METHODIST.

At the evening service Rev. H. W.
Locke chose as his text, I. Samuel x.
24.—"God Save the King."He said about one hundred and fifty
years ago these words were para-
phrased into what has ever since been
regarded as our National Anthem.
For the last sixty years they have
been sung in honor of a Sovereign
Lady who has reigned during a long-
er period, over a more extensive ter-
ritory, and during a more advanced
age, materially, intellectually and re-
ligiously, than any of her predecessors.
British subjects all over this
Empire will not find it difficult to
show this glad acclaim in honor of
him, who has succeeded to the British
throne, as he is, perhaps, the most
popular sovereign of Europe to-day.
But we ask you not to regard it mere-
ly as an acclamation, but as a prayer.
We should pray this prayer for the
King—
1st. Because God commands prayer
for kings and all in authority.
2nd. On account of the peculiar
temptations pertaining to royalty.
3rd. On account of court influence
throughout the realm.
4th. The burdens and dangers con-
fined with royalty. "Uneasy lies the
head that wears a crown."
5th. Because kings require salva-
tion as well as peasant-conquering
kings, by the words of Kipling's "Reces-
sional."

given a military funeral, as they were
members of Walkerville Company, No.
4, 21st Essex Fusiliers.

London, Jan. 28.—The Amster-

press wires that news has been re-
ceived there that Kruger is very
seriously ill, that his medical at-
tendant almost despairs of his life
and that three doctors visit him
