ITEMS FROM CHURCH STREET



MT. A. DEFEATS ACADIA

Score Was 34 to 24 in Intercollegiate Basket-ball Game

Acadia played her first game of intercollegiate basket-ball here Wednesday night losing to Mt. Allison by the score of 34 to 24. Both teams were in fine trim and the game was fast and exciting throughout. Mt. A. scored first on a penalty and Acadia immediately tied the score. Wigmore made a fine shot from centre and put Acadia in the lead, which she maintained throughout the first half. The game zig-zagged back and forth ending with score 16-13 in favor of Acadia. In this period Downey scored all but two of the Mt. A. points.

The second period was as fast as the first. Toward the end of the period Mt. A. tied the score making it 20-20. Then Mt. A. scored another basket putting them in the lead. This was followed at once by another. A few minutes later Brown scored for Acadia. Mount A's guarding was especially fine, holding Acadia from scoring. Mt. A. scored again from the side a minute later and followed by another within a minute both sides scored on the next minute and then Mt. A. put the ball in again just before the whistle blew. Final score 32-24 in favor of Mt. A.
