KEIN CONSERVATIVES NOMINATE DOUCET

Only Name Before Convention—The Candidate Addresses Meeting.

Reston, Aug. 31.—The Kent county Conservative convention held here this afternoon was attended by over six hundred people. John Morton was chosen chairman, and Telesphore Arsenault, secretary. Nearly three hundred delegates were present from all sections of the county. Alexander J. Doucet, M. P., was nominated unanimously, his name being the only one before the convention.

A county executive was then formed consisting of the chairman and secretary, and one from each polling subdivision of the county.

The meeting was addressed by Mr. Doucet, Hon. Dr. D. V. Landry, A. E. O'Leary, Telesphore Arsenault and Noel McLaughlin, barrister, of Campbellton. There was much enthusiasm and a Conservative victory in the next federal election was predicted by all the speakers.

There was a short discussion as to whether the convention should be confined to the regular delegates from the different parishes, and several, including Mr. Doucet, declared for an "open convention." The matter was put to the convention by motion, and it was unanimous that the selection of candidates be by open convention.

This morning, Mr. Doucet, then nominated Mr. Doucet. The motion was seconded by Councillor David Clark, of Harcourt, and Hon. Dr. D. V. Landry, of Stouffville, and carried unanimously. Chairman Morton declared Mr. Doucet nominated and amid cheers Mr. Doucet was asked to come to the platform. He was followed by Hon. Dr. Landry and A. E. O'Leary.

On rising to acknowledge the honor done him Mr. Doucet was greeted with prolonged cheers and applause. He expressed in both French and English his pleasure at receiving the expression of confidence in him. It was gratifying to know, he stated, that when one had performed his duties to the satisfaction of his constituents to receive re-nomination at the hands of the constituents.

Mr. Doucet said their opponents would doubtless be stimulated by their success in Kent in the recent provincial election and would redouble their efforts in the coming election. It would be necessary for his own friends to redouble their efforts too. Fortnightly, said the speaker, there were some issues of the last election which would not come up in the one to come. He believed that if the opponents of the present Government worked as they should his own majority would be much larger than it was in 1923.

It was up to them, he said, to show up the weaknesses of the present Government and their inability to use the peoples' money as it should be used. Moreover, the Liberal Government was only being kept in power by having given concessions to the west to the detriment of the other parts of the country. (Applause) In 1921 Mr. Hanna had stated that the railways east of Montreal would come under his control at Moncton. The Liberals had laughed at that and said it was mere pre-election dream, but what was the situation since? In 1923 some 450 families had been removed from Moncton to Montreal and shortly after they reached their pay was reduced by about \$35 a month and the result was that many of them were obliged to give up their jobs and some to seek employment south of the border.

There was bituminous coal in plenty in Nova Scotia, but they were unable to get it into the Upper Canadian markets, while \$10,000,000 of good Canadian money was being sent over into the United States to develop the coal mines of that country instead of purchasing our own coal.

"We have all the natural resources necessary in the way of iron and coal to supply all the steel produced and more than we need, yet, due to the tinkering with the tariff by the Mackenzie King group the country is purchasing \$117,000,000 worth of steel from the United States, while our own steel works in Sydney lie in idleness," he declared.

"How can we expect anything else," he asked, "when conditions are such that our own blood and drawn are forced to go to the United States in search of employment? The time has come to turn out of power Mackenzie King and his followers who have been responsible for present conditions," he concluded.

THE TRANSFER OF A PROVINCE TO PERU

[The Associated Press.] Tacna, Chile, Sept. 1.—The Province of Tarata will be transferred to Peru today. The formal ceremony will mark the execution of the first provision of President Coolidge's award rendered in the Tacna-Arica dispute between Chile and Peru.

The commissioners will transfer the Province from Chilean to Peruvian Suzerainty to-day and immediately return to the task of devoting themselves again to the task of the Tacna-Arica plebiscite which will decide which country, Peru or Chile, shall rule over the disputed provinces.

FIRE AT JEMSEG.

Lower Jemseg, N. B., Aug. 31.—Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the barn of Fred Mason, of Lower Jemseg, with all its contents. Friday evening, when the family was away from home. There is no insurance to cover the loss, which is estimated at about \$1,000. The barn was full of hay and grain. A load of grain was still on the wagon, having just been hauled into the barn that evening.

In order to gather some of the corn that James H. Templeton, of Pans, Ill., raised it was necessary for Templeton to mount a 10-foot ladder. Then he plucked the ears and handed them down to Mrs. Templeton. The corn stalks measured 14 feet and 6 inches in height.

THE PRINCE INSPECTS SEVERAL RANCHES

Will Leave the Argentine Republic on Saturday for Chile.

Buenos Aires, Sept. 1.—Accompanied by an official reception committee of prominent members of the British Colony and publishers of Buenos Aires newspapers, the Prince of Wales travelled in a special train yesterday through parts of Argentina and visited several ranches owned by Englishmen. Today he will inspect the British meat packing plant in Colon, in the Province of Entre Rios, where he will board a steamer down the Parana River for the capital, arriving Wednesday morning.

The Prince will spend Wednesday in Buenos Aires and leave that night for San Marcos ranch, in the Province of Buenos Aires, where he will be the guest of Jack Nelson, the Argentine polo player, until Saturday, when he leaves for Chile.

SWITCHMAN LOST LEG AT MONCTON

Moncton, Aug. 31.—Aubrey Steeves, Gunningville, Albert county, lost his right foot as the result of an accident to the C. N. R. yard here today. While he was at work as switchman his foot was so badly crushed that it was necessary to amputate it in the hospital. Steeves attempted to board the front of a locomotive but slipped, the wheels passing over his right foot. He was crawling to a shanty, where he was found by Brakeman Meade. Dr. L. H. Price was summoned and the injured man was removed to the hospital. Mr. Steeves lost an arm in an accident several years ago.

THE EXTENSION OF NORTHUMBERLAND ST.

Communication From Samuel Cook Received at City Hall From Edmonton.

A new difficulty has arisen in the way of the extension of Northumberland street.

Samuel Cook, formerly a resident of this city and now living at Edmonton, Alta., has written City Treasurer Chestnut declining to adhere to a proposition made several years ago to deed the portion of his property required for the street upon the ground that the city had violated the agreement by increasing the assessment on this property from \$1500 to \$3,000 whereas, he claims, there was an agreement that there should be no increase.

In the assessment, until some houses were built on the property. He wrote that he had made such an agreement in 1900. Others believe that the extension of the street was not over assessed; either \$4,000 or \$4,500 had been refused by Mr. Cook for the property. On the other hand, he said, it was highly necessary that the extension be made with for extension of the surface drain which was part of the agreement because it crosses Mr. Cook's property. Mr. Cook contends that crossing this property by this surface drain was not authorized by him. Ald. Cooper pointed out that the citizens owning property in the vicinity were expecting to have the surface drain project carried out—a bond issue for the purpose had been authorized.

The matter was finally referred to the Roads and Streets Committee. Later on a resolution authorizing the project for extension of Winslow street to be proceeded with was passed.

TAG THE SALMON TO KEEP TAB ON THEM

Ottawa, Aug. 31.—The Department of Marine and Fisheries has marked a considerable number of Atlantic salmon by attaching silver tags to their dorsal fins, for the purpose of learning something regarding the movements of these fish.

A salmon that was marked and liberated at Burr's Point, Port Maitland, Yarmouth county, N. S., on June 11 last, was killed in the Molais River, Que., in the early part of July. If this fish took the most direct route, it travelled about 900 miles; but if it followed the larger indentations of the shoreline, it travelled over 1,800 miles.

CHILD BURNED.

Halifax, Aug. 31.—Roasting park-winkles over a beach fire in the park here, Joan Bennett, six, went too near the flames and her dress caught. Ablaze from head to foot she ran to her home suffering such terrible burns that she died later in hospital.

PAY HOUSING BOARD ACCOUNTS OF \$280

Final Statement Presented to the City Council Last Night.

The City Council passed a resolution last night upon motion of Ald. W. L. Jennings, a member of the Housing Board, approving the payment of \$280.54 to the Housing Board, which will pay off the board's indebtedness and permit its dissolution.

A statement presented to the City Council showed the Housing Board's indebtedness to be \$672.50, made up largely of salary for the secretary and solicitors' fees. The statement, which was duly audited, showed \$392 on hand. Ald. Jennings explained that the solicitors' account was largely made of costs of searching titles to properties on which houses were erected under the Housing Act scheme. When it was suggested that the individual properties should have paid their own expenses he replied that it had been intended they should and 1/2 of 1 per cent. of all loans had been withheld for the purpose of paying the expenses of administration, but the amount had proven insufficient.

Some discussion arose regarding the lawsuit over the Simmons property. Ald. Jennings said that the case was to come up this month. He also asserted that "the title to that land is all O. K., but otherwise there was no further information given."
