KEIN CONSERVATIVES NOMINATE DOUCET

Only Name Before Convention—The Candidate Addresses Meeting.

Reston, Aug. 31.—The Kent county Conservative convention held here this afternoon was attended by over six hundred people. John Morton was chosen chairman, and Telesphore Arsenault, secretary. Nearly three hundred delegates were present from all sections of the county. Alexander J. Doucet, M. P., was nominated unanimously, his name being the only one before the convention.

A county executive was then formed consisting of the chairman and secretary, and one from each polling subdivision of the county.

The meeting was addressed by Mr. Doucet, Hon. Dr. D. V. Landry, A. E. O'Leary, Telesphore Arsenault and Noel McLaughlin, barrister, of Campbellton. There was much enthusiasm and a Conservative victory in the next federal election was predicted by all the speakers.

There was a short discussion as to whether the convention should be confined to the regular delegates from the different parishes, and several, including Mr. Doucet, declared for an "open convention." The matter was put to the convention by motion, and it was unanimous that the selection of candidates be by open convention.

This morning, of Reston, then nominated Mr. Doucet. The motion was seconded by Councillor David Clark, of Harcourt, and Hon. Dr. D. V. Landry, of Stouffville, and carried unanimously. Chairman Morton declared Mr. Doucet nominated and amid cheers Mr. Doucet was asked to come to the platform. He was followed by Hon. Dr. Landry and A. E. O'Leary.

On rising to acknowledge the honor done him Mr. Doucet was greeted with prolonged cheers and applause. He expressed in both French and English his pleasure at receiving the expression of confidence in him. It was gratifying to know, he stated, that when one had performed his duties to his satisfaction he was placed in him to receive re-nomination at the hands of the constituents.

Mr. Doucet said their opponents would doubtless be stimulated by their success in Kent in the recent provincial election and would redouble their efforts in the coming election. It would be necessary for his own friends to redouble their efforts too. Fortnightly said the speaker, there were some issues of the last election which would not come up in the one to come. He believed that if the opponents of the present Government worked as they should his own majority would be much larger than it was in 1923.

It was up to them, he said, to show up the weaknesses of the present Government and their inability to use the peoples' money as it should be used. Moreover, the Liberal Government was only being kept in power by having given concessions to the west to the detriment of the other parts of the country. (Applause) In 1921 Mr. Hanna had stated that the railways east of Montreal would come under his control at Moncton. The Liberals had laughed at that and said it was mere pre-election dream, but what was the situation since? In 1923 some 450 families had been removed from Moncton to Montreal and shortly after they reached their pay was reduced by about \$35 a month and the result was that many of them were obliged to give up their jobs and some to seek employment south of the border.

There was bituminous coal in plenty in Nova Scotia, but they were unable to get it into the Upper Canadian markets, while \$40,000,000 of good Canadian money was being sent over into the United States to develop the coal mines of that country instead of purchasing our own coal.

"We have all the natural resources necessary in the way of iron and coal to supply all the steel produced and more than we need, yet, due to the tinkering with the tariff by the Mackenzie King group the country is purchasing \$117,000,000 worth of steel from the United States, while our own steel works in Sydney lie in idleness," he declared.

"How can we expect anything else," he asked, "when conditions are such that our own blood and drawn are forced to go to the United States in search of employment? The time has come to turn out of power Mackenzie King and his followers who have been responsible for present conditions," he concluded.

THE EXTENSION OF NORTHUMBERLAND ST.

Communication From Samuel Cook Received at City Hall From Edmonton.

A new difficulty has arisen in the way of the extension of Northumberland street.

Samuel Cook, formerly a resident of this city and now living at Edmonton, Alta., has written City Treasurer Chestnut declining to adhere to a proposition made several years ago to deed the portion of his property required for the street upon the ground that the city had violated the agreement by increasing the assessment on this property from \$1500 to \$3,000 whereas, he claims, there was an agreement that there should be no increase. In the assessment until some houses were built on the property. He wrote that he had made such an agreement in 1900. Others believe that the extension of the street was not over assessed; either \$4,000 or \$4,500 had been refused by Mr. Cook for the property. On the other hand, he said, it was highly necessary that the extension of the street with for extension of the surface drain which was part of the agreement because it crosses Mr. Cook's property. Mr. Cook contends that crossing this property by this surface drain was not authorized by him. Ald. Cooper pointed out that the citizens owning property in the vicinity were expecting to have the surface drain project carried out—a bond issue for the purpose had been authorized.

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
