Washington, June 5.—As a means of checking tuberculosis in the principal cities of Brazil the sanitary authorities of that country have instituted a campaign involving the expenditure of \$1,250,000.

MARKETS and FINANCE

TORONTO MARKETS.

Receipts of live stock at the city market for Wednesday and Thursday, as reported by the railways, were 198 car loads, composed of 1,211 cattle, 320 hogs, 63 sheep and 603 calves.

The quality of cattle was fairly good, that is for this season.

Exporters—Export steers sold from \$8 to \$10 for few of prime quality and medium, \$7.75 to \$8. Export bulls, \$4.50 to \$5. Butchers—Prime picked lots sold at \$7.75 to \$8; loads of good, \$5.40 to \$5.60; medium, \$5 to \$5.30; common, \$4.70 to \$5; cows, \$3.50 to \$4.15; canners \$2 to \$3 per cwt.

Feeders and stockers—Good steers, 1,000 to 1,100 lbs each, at \$4.75 to \$5 per cwt; good steers, 800 to 900 lbs each, at \$3.50 to \$4.25; good steers, 600 to 900 lbs each, at \$3.25 to \$3.50; light stockers, 400 to 500 lbs each, at \$3 to \$3.25.

Milkers and springers—The market for all classes of cows was off about 25 per cent. Prices ranged from \$20 to \$25 each, the bulk selling from \$25 to \$30 each, although two or three extra quality cows during the week brought more money.

Veal calves—Receipts large, prices easy at \$2 to \$2.50 per cwt.

Sheep and lambs—Receipts were liberal, larger than for some time. Export ewes, \$4.00 to \$5 per cwt; rams, \$10 to \$12; yearling lambs, \$5 to \$5.50; spring lambs, \$3 to \$5 each.

Hogs—Receipts large, market steady at \$6 for select, and \$5.75 for lights.

British cattle markets. London—London cables for cattle are steady, \$2.50 in barrels and \$0.10 per lb. Berlin—Market for hogs is quiet. Delivery, car lots 5c less.

The cheese markets. Winchester—To-day, 603 white and 120 colored were registered, nearly all sold on board. Price of white, 14c; white, 14c; colored, 12c. Alexandria—To-day, 4,971 were offered; all sold at 12c.

Wool—To-day, 300 white and 100 colored were offered, all sold on board at 13 1/2c. A resolution was passed that no cheese be loaded on this board under week old.

London—To-day, 1,882 boxes of Vankleek Hill—There were 1,882 boxes cheese boarded and sold on board here today. Price offered was 14c, and at this figure all sold.

London—To-day, 314 boxes registered, more colored than white. Price offered, 2,000 boxes sold at this price on board.

WALL STREET NEWS.

Spot copper in London is 3d higher, and London 25c higher than in New York. New York banks gained \$1.24 through sub-treasury operations since Friday last.

London market closes for Whitsun holidays from Friday night till Tuesday morning.

Iron Age thinks out in bar steel will be normally affected other commodities.

Gold situation likely to result in consolidation of Wheeling and Lake Erie and Wabash and Pittsburgh terminals.

Canadian failures. Insolvencies in the Dominion of Canada, according to statistics compiled by R. G. Dun & Co., were also more satisfactory in May than in recent preceding months, and make a close comparison with similar returns for the same month last year.

The total number of 115 defaults compares with 94 year ago, and liabilities of \$77,433 slightly exceeded the \$73,245 last year. There is also little difference in comparison with May, 1906, when there were 96 failures, involving \$712,175. Manufacturing defaults this year numbered 37, with liabilities of \$289,028, against 28 similar failures last year for \$203,665. Trading failures were 76 in number and \$407,905 in amount, against 62 insolvencies last year for \$517,083. There were 20 other commercial failures for \$80,000 against four last year, with liabilities of \$12,500.

CUT IN STEEL.

Glasgow, June 5.—Following the lead of American, the steel makers of Scotland have reduced prices all around by five shillings a ton.

Mexico City, June 4.—Word has just reached this city that 20 lives
