Potatoes sold at \$2.25, turnips at \$1. butter at 35c, eggs at 35c, chickens at \$1 to \$1.50, fowl at \$1, honey at 25c a jar, cabbage at 5c, corn at 12c, celery at 10c, lamb at \$1 to \$1.50, apples at \$1.50 to \$3; ducks at \$1.50.
