EDMONTON NEWS

LOCAL. The Premier at Brockville.

RIVER ROSE MONDAY NIGHT.
The Saskatchewan river rose about three feet last night and this morning marked the highest point of the season. It is, however, about nine feet lower than the flood of last year that washed away large quantities of logs in the booms of the local mills. The lumbermen here did not anticipate any danger this year unless the trouble is caused by heavy rains later in the summer.

RECKLESS RIFLE FIRING.
Residents of Clover Bar are somewhat incensed over the indiscriminate use of long range firearms by some unknown parties in the neighborhood. A prominent farmer was recently struck in the thigh by a spent ball while in the field, and a steer on his farm was found limping from a bullet wound. Several other people have reported hearing bullets whizzing through the air uncomfortably close to their heads. As no reports of the rifles have been heard the parties doing the firing have not been located.

COMING TO EDMONTON.
After unsuccessfully applying to the civic authorities for a license to act as palmists and fortune tellers, a band of roving gypsies who had been encamped at the Centre street bridge in Calgary, are moving on in the direction of Edmonton. The party consisted of four men and three women, with numerous children and dogs. Although they appeared very well behaved in most respects, they proved a great nuisance by their singing ways and several complaints were received at the police station regarding them. Chief English of Calgary investigated, and on Saturday ordered them to move out of the city. They left about one hour after the order had been received.

HOMESTEADERS ARE COMING.
The arrivals at the Immigration Hall have been quite uniform from week to week from the beginning of the year, but an improvement has been noticed during the past two weeks. For the week ending Saturday night, 75 immigrants arrived and secured accommodation while 80 left for parts to the north and west of the United States. The Germans are locating largely at Stoney Plains and the others are heading for the north country. There remained 61 in the hall at the end of the week. The people who call at the Immigration Hall this year, with few exceptions, are people intending to take up homesteads in the Edmonton district. Very few are making inquiries for work as has been the case in the past. The settlers are said to be the very best class of Germans, Englishmen and immigrants.

HILL WILL BUILD ROAD INTO ALBERTA

Lines in the Mountains Will Be Explored to Reach Prairie Country—J. J. Hill, interviewed.
Calgary, June 15.—Mayor Jamieson, who has just returned from the Seattle Exposition, says that he had an interview with J. J. Hill when he was at the coast and that the Great Northern magnate informed him that he was rushing his Pentecost branch in British Columbia to completion in order that he might get a foothold in the Rockies, and thus be in a position to reach out and tap the rich oil and gas fields of the province more effectively. The people of this province need not be surprised, Mr. Hill said, if they woke up some fine day and found that he had swooped down into this territory, as that was his intention. Mayor Jamieson said that the Senator had given a report which was manifested in the exhibits that were representative of Canada's resources.

Wesley Students Win.

Moose Jaw, Sask., June 13.—The Methodist Conference is in full swing. Saturday a great deal of routine work was accomplished, while today many of the delegates have occupied pulpits in the various churches in the province. Rev. S. G. Blair, D.D., preached an eloquent and inspiring ordination sermon in Zion Church this morning. During the consideration of the memorial questions Saturday, Principal Spaulding of Wesley College, Winnipeg, laid emphasis on the case of the students of Wesley College, who were expelled from that institution in the recent examinations. Seven out of the eight students of Wesley College were taken by students of Wesley Methodist. The Rhodes scholar for this year was a third year Wesley student. He presented the annual report, which showed a large growth and the necessity for increased support.

Sanitary Inspector Blamed.

Calgary, June 12.—A charge was laid against the Sanitary Inspector this morning, to the effect that he does not comply with the regulations for the safeguard of public health, inasmuch as he fails to fumigate his clothing after visiting the smallpox pest house. A patient who has been in the pest house for nearly two weeks, and who was released a few days ago, stated that the sanitary inspector, who makes several trips to the pest house in a week, neglects to fumigate his clothing when leaving, as he should, in compliance with the regulations. When the sanitary inspector was asked whether the accusation was true, he replied that he did not feel called upon to answer such a question that he was not answerable to the man who made the charge, or to the newspaper, and did not wish to speak at any further length on the subject.

C.P.R. Cars Burned.

Port Arthur, Ont., June 13.—A spectacular and rather costly fire was caused in the C.P.R. yards by a brakeman stumbling and breaking his lamp. A nearby car, containing the Imperial Oil Company, was leaking, and immediately a blaze was up. An adjoining car of maple flooring, consigned to Lethbridge, also caught. The other cars were detached from those burning, which were destroyed. Loss \$3,000.

Soldier Shoots Officers.

Des Moines, Iowa, June 14.—Corp. Lisle Crabtree yesterday fatally shot Capt. John C. Raymond, commanding officer of troop B, second U. S. cavalry, at Fort De Moin, then shot and seriously injured first Sgt. James H. Washburn, and Corp. Elijah Sueh who attempted to disarm him, and then shot himself. Crabtree had been reprimanded by Capt. Raymond because of his failure to report when his leave of absence had expired.

Can Duty Temperance Act.

Fredericton, N.B., June 12.—The supreme court yesterday quashed the conviction of Police Magistrate Marsh against L.C.R. Station Agent R. L. Walker, for receiving and warehousing liquor in violation of the Canadian Temperance Act, on the ground that the road, being the property of the Crown, the provisions of the act do not apply to it.

Drowned at Lethbridge.

Lethbridge, Alta., June 14.—Two slaves were drowned in the Belly River yesterday while fishing. So far their bodies have not been recovered. Each leaves a wife and family.
