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That Timber Scandal.

And Southern Shore Affairs.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir—My attention was drawn to a letter in the "Chronicle" signed "Coaster" in reply to some correspondent to the Telegram on the subject of wood cutting at LaManche by the Reid Nfd. Co.

I am not much interested in newspaper twaddle of this kind, but I would like to make a few comments on the letter of "Coaster." He seems to assume the writer was some particular person at Tor's Cove, who, from the tone and references of his scribble, occasions him need of sedlitz powder every time anything appears in print in reference to "local" Government doings.

I saw the letter in the Telegram and I am quite certain it was not written at Tor's Cove nor by a Tor's Cove man. I have no idea however who the writer may be.

He, however, is quite correct in his statements about the cutting of wood in the vicinity of La Manche. Large and small timber has been cut over a considerable area, and it was here that the people from Tor's Cove to La Manche got not only firing for the most part, but flake and stage-building material. We were of opinion that timber within three miles of the coast was reserved for the uses of the fishermen.

I am not now stating whether I approve or not of the cutting of this timber.

That "Coaster" does not write from a lucid interval at the time of writing for a newspaper. He may have been a little muddled. He says he "saw in last night's Telegram."

How a Tor's Cove man could see an article in last night's Telegram (Nov. 1st), and write a reply from Tor's Cove in time for the "Chronicle" of November 2nd, is a feat in newspaper correspondence that will be hard to beat. The opinion of the newspaper writer is that this insolent concoction was written in the Chronicle office and was inspired by Cashin and Moore, or one of them, with the foregone conclusion that some one of standing at Tor's Cove that may have given them some indigestible pills to swallow, is always writing of them in censorious spirit. It is a pity that men on the trail haven't intelligence enough to cover up their own tracks.

As usual nothing is right with him because he hasn't his finger in the pie." This is not a happy metaphor coming from members of the Picnic Party. Do these worthies think we have forgotten how ignominiously in that matter of Giovannetti? Cashin and Moore will never muster "brass" enough to face the people of this end of the District again. Probably they will have put away "pie" while they may lie off and take lessons in the Science of Good Government, and examine their consciences on four or five years of maladministration, in which they were either principles or accomplices.

Even the purchased friends of Cashin and Moore know how they stand before the bar of public opinion on the Southern Shore, and it will be time enough to arraign them when they think of starting for another picnic.

Englishman Fights King.

But Sixteen Dusky Wives Cause Him to Run Away Through Their "Nagging," Monkey Guides Him To Huntig Party. — Ship Engineer's Weird Experience in Jungle of East Coast of Africa.

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Stranger adventure than that which befell an Englishman on the East Coast of Africa is seldom met with outside the realms of fiction.

While hunting in the jungle he fell asleep, was brought before a tribal ruler, fought that potentate, became ruler because of the attachment for him by a sacred monkey and entered into full royal possession, including the dusky harem. His rule was of short duration, for, according to his own account the "sixteen wives" practically henpecked him off the throne. His escape also makes thrilling reading.

The story of Mr. Hugh Edward Gillespie is told by the Manchester Dispatch. Mr. Gillespie is a native of Newcastle, who, after serving an apprenticeship at Hawthorne, entered the services of the Prince line nine years ago, and at the time of his adventure was, as he still is, second engineer on the Royal Prince, then trading from Mombassa in New York, and had long nourished the desire to have some big game shooting.

Asleep in Jungle.

At Mombassa he obtained the necessary leave, and, with a guide, set out for the jungle. Coming on the trail of elands, they followed it up until the tracks became stronger. The guide suggested their separating so as to come on the game from two sides, and this was done.

Alone, Gillespie followed the trail until he felt he was either lost or in danger of it, whereupon he tried to get his guide by shouting, but no answer came. Tired, weak, and hungry, he sat down to contemplate the situation, but fell asleep.

He was roughly awakened by a number of natives, who took possession of his rifle and revolver, and marched him to their village, and before their king.

King Knocked Out.

The natives kow-towed to their monarch, and tried to make the Englishman do the same. This he refused to do, and, as they persisted, he lost his temper, and struck out with such effect that three of the natives were on the ground.

The king, evidently incensed at the treatment of his men, made a blind rush for Gillespie. As he came on with his head down, like a mad bull, Gillespie stepped aside and delivered a telling blow which laid him on the ground. No fewer than six times did the savage make similar bull-like rushes, each time to receive exactly the same telling blows.

Then he tried close quarters, and for fully half an hour the two fought, wrestled and wriggled on the ground, each getting a blow in when the opportunity offered. At last Gillespie delivered the "knockout" and while he was recovering his breath and generally pulling himself together the stranger thing happened.

sitting at the side of the throne, and to Gillespie and climbed on his shoulder.

The natives prostrated themselves face down on the ground and gave utterance to weird cries.

The rest of the story is best told in Mr. Gillespie's own words: "An old chap, with a big staff, the head carved in the shape of a strange bird, came towards me, and kow-towed. Then he pointed to me and motioned towards the throne. I then began to realize that I was chosen to be their king. I walked towards the throne and the natives chanted a weird heathen song. When I sat down, with the monkey still on my shoulder, they cheered so loud that they brought the king back to consciousness. He took a good look at me upon the throne and fled rapidly into the forest.

"God" Chose Ruler.

"I was duly made king by the chief medicine man. I soon learned how it all came about. The monkey it seems, was a sort of personification of the god which lived in the depth of the jungle, whom the natives worshipped, and when it jumped on my shoulders they accepted that as a sign that their god chose me as their ruler.

"But my troubles began very soon. All because of the royal wives, of whom there were sixteen. The man who finds himself henpecked by one wife is to be pitied, but think of a man henpecked by sixteen! This was my case.

"These wives wore strings of human teeth as necklaces and they were always wanting more. I sent the hunters of my tribe out to get more but they were unsuccessful, and the wives yammered and scolded day and night in consequence. After I had been king of the tribe for about three weeks I concluded that the job was not to my liking, and I decided to escape.

"One night, when the sixteen wives, came towards me, and kow-towed, I saw the monkey on my head was swimming. I tipped over the hut, stole through the village, and made for the woods. I had not gone far when I heard a noise which made me blood cold. I thought my sixteen wives were on my trail, but when I looked back I saw it was only the sacred monkey.

Four-Legged Guide.

"I stopped, and as soon as it reached me it climbed on my shoulder, gathering affectionately in my ears. At night I stumbled through the jungle with the monkey as my only guide. That monkey was my salvation. It took me in the right direction. About sunset the next day, when I was famishing for food and water, I came on the camp of an English hunting party.

"Well to make a long story short, the Englishmen guided me back to Mombassa, and when I went on board the Royal Prince the crew thought I was a ghost.

"It is a strange story, but it is true. And if Sophia—that is the monkey's name now—could only speak, she would confirm every word of it. I did not inherit royalty; I was thrust upon me, and I have been sufficient of it."

Mr. Gillespie's fellow engineers, with whom he is very popular, verify his story of his adventures.

Convict's Plea Save a Youth

Chicago, Oct. 31.—The plea of an old convict saved Charles Broadbent, eighteen years old, from a penitentiary sentence.

"I'm an old convict," he said, "I've been in the penitentiary, so let me go back there again. It can't hurt me any more than it has. But this time I was led astray by me. It was my fault, not his. Don't ruin him by sending him to the pen. I know he'll blast a man's life."

This plea by Marcus Nelson, who with Broadbent, held up four men, caused the younger prisoner to be sent to reform school. Judge Cooper sent Nelson back to the penitentiary.
