Referring to the criticism on the inadequacy of the force detailed for the advance on Bagdad, Marquis Crewe, Lord President of the Council, said in the Lords yesterday afternoon, that this criticism was due to a misapprehension. The force at the disposal of General Townsend, he said, was considerably larger than a division and was believed by competent authorities to be sufficient for the task assigned to it. It was also a misapprehension to say this was a rash military adventure, continued Crewe, as it was clear to everybody the early capture of Bagdad if it could be effected would have great results on the war and not only military results. The force set apart for the purpose was by universal competent military opinion considered large enough. It was evident the troops behaved splendidly but the task proved bigger than was anticipated. Baron Sydenham thought one bright spot in a very dark picture was the manner in which General Townsend's forces fought at Ctesiphon.
