At that time Whitbourne was quite a thriving place, and it was the custom of the Rev. Dr. Lucas to go to the hotel and stay in the hotel. The dispute between the good Doctor and the proprietor grew very heated, and it led to a lot of correspondence in our daily papers; and it was very detrimental to any good impressions which the good man may have made. In his correspondence he was very indiscreet; but it seems to be a failure of good people, to display a proper share of discretion. In their goodness, and in their desire to do good to others, they seem to think that they have become the sole proprietors, and the sole possessors, of all the graces; and that if others do not see eye to eye with them they are utterly astray. This trait is largely developed among men of the class of whom we now write; and it is this trait which sometimes makes them Evangelists, instead of ordinary Christians or regular clergy.

This is why Evangelists sometimes fail, and why only such a small number of them really gain the ear of the public. Such men as Moody succeeded, and such men as Torrey were sustained, in their work. Such men as I have written of, succeeded, and those who have recently visited our city have succeeded, and they will continue to do so; but there are those who fall short, and whose star is never in the ascendency. This class of men seldom get the support of a strong committee of management, and at their best they only manage to keep afloat. One Billy Sunday, and one Fay B. Mills, or one Dr. Moody, or one Hunter, or one Mrs. Demarest, is worth twenty such people. But the Sunday's, and the Mills's, and the Moody's, and the Hunter's, and the Demarest's are rare; nor is it easy to duplicate them. Lots try but fail. Nature never meant them for the work of an Evangelist; and what nature has not adapted a man to, grace will have its hands full to fit him for. Mistake in vocations are at all times lamentable; but of all the sorry plights into which men get, none are more lamentable, nor more pitiable, nor more humiliating, than that of the man, who thinks he has been called to specially preach the Gospel; but who lacks the first principles of such a great work. These men start out to preach a Gospel which saves people from their sins; but they personally have never been "saved from themselves"; and he who is not saved from himself, must surely fail in his efforts to save others.

Precautionary Measures

Owing to the presence of "flu" in the community, every precaution will be taken by the Marine and Fisheries Department to prevent an outbreak among the sealing crews during the prosecution of the voyage. The steamer owners have been circularized to co-operate with Dr. Campbell, Port Officer, in the matter, who will make arrangements to cope with any cases that may occur at the icefields. In the interim between sailing day, a thorough inspection of the hospital accommodation on the different ships will be made, medicine chests will be refilled under the direction of the doctor and regulations will be made, which if carried out by the crews in co-operation with the ships' doctors there will be very little possibility of any outbreak of disease on the ships. Also before sailing, every member of the crews will be medically examined, and before being allowed to sign on for the voyage must prove vaccination within a certain period.

Grenfell Assn. Report.

We thank the International Grenfell Association for a copy of their official magazine, "Among the Deep Sea Fishers," for the end of 1918. In this issue appear the reports of the Superintendent, Chairman of the Directors, various committees and Secretary, and a perusal of these show the Association to have accomplished much good in the year just ended. A letter from the late Governor, Sir W. E. Davidson, expressed his thanks to the Seamen's Institute of this city for the hospitality and kindness accorded the many shipwrecked crews that have taken shelter there from time to time, and that the entire country joins in this, we feel sure.

The "Stamp" of Coolness.

"You chaps talk about nerve and keeping cool under fire, but I've seen a finer bit of presence of mind right here in my home town than I saw when I was in the thick of things over there. I was motoring with a friend, and as he was driving through the village he lost control of the car. "Wellington" Damaged.

The S. S. Wellington which was on fire in New York harbour was considerably damaged and her repairs will cost thousands of dollars. The Wellington was discharging her cargo of tobacco and sage when the fire made its appearance, but some of the crew think that it must have been smouldering for some time, and was only kept down because of lack of air.

The Last Invasion of England.

Yesterday, February 24th is the day that is memorable as being that upon which—in the year 1797—the last invasion was made by an enemy on the shores of Great Britain. Three men-of-war and a larger man-of-war, by the name of the Penelope, landed the invaders—six hundred regular troops and about eight hundred convicts and sweepings from the prisons of France. The news of the invasion created great alarm in the country, the number of the army being grossly exaggerated, and the inhabitants of St. David's and the neighbouring towns hastened to arm themselves. The lead was stripped from the roof of the Cathedral and made into bullets, and those villagers who did not possess guns assembled armed with scythes and reaping-hooks. By nightfall all the British forces available—consisting of yeomanry, cavalry, two companies of infantry, with some seamen and artillery, under the command of Lord Cawdor, arrived on the scene. As the French vessels had in the meantime sailed away, leaving the invaders without any means of retreat, it was not surprising that they should offer to lay down their arms peaceably, provided they were promised a safe conduct to Brest. This offer the British refused, and demanded an unconditional surrender, which was immediately given, and the invaders were marched off in detachments, under escort, to various prisons in Pembroke, Carmarthen, and Milford. For this the Pembroke-shire Imperial Yeomanry have the honour "Fishguard" on their appointments and colours.
