Fred H. Ellis & Co. have purchased the S.S. Susu, which was stranded at Little Bay last fall and later refloated by Captain Porter. She has been at the dock pier for several weeks, repairs having been made to the hull, engines and cabins, and she is now in first-class condition. It is understood that the Susu will take up the

mail and passenger service on the Fogo route as soon as ice conditions permit.

Newfoundlander Dies Abroad.

Silas Partridge Knight, inventor of an electrotyping process for making copper plates for fine printing, died yesterday at his home, 83 Seventh avenue. He was 88 years old and one of the oldest members of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows in the United States. Mr. Knight was born at St. John's, Nfld., on Jan. 21, 1831. He invented his electrotyping process at Boston and came to Brooklyn in 1852. He succeeded in having an electrotyping department installed at Harper Brothers and Co., in Manhattan, and was a superintendent with that firm for forty years. Mr. Knight attributed his long life to temperance in habits and food, together with vigorous exercise. His wife, Lydia Gunderson, died in Brooklyn twenty years ago. Mr. Knight is survived by a son and three daughters.—Brooklyn Standard Union, Saturday, June 14th, 1919.

Obituary.

H. C. MORRIS.

Miss Nellie Morris, 73 Long's Hill, received the sad news of the death of her brother H. C. (Charlie) Morris, at Halifax on Monday last, following an operation for appendicitis, from Archdeacon Armitage. The deceased who was well known in St. John's, was for many years an official of the Marine and Fisheries department, subsequently going to Halifax, Nova Scotia in which city he won for himself the esteem of all with whom he came in contact. The late Mr. Morris was the eldest son of Captain Stephen and Margaret Morris, both of whom entered into rest years ago. The only surviving near relatives are a sister (Nellie) and a brother, (George). The body will be brought to St. John's for interment in the Church of England Cemetery where the wife and adopted daughter of the deceased are buried. To the bereaved brother and sister the Telegram offers sincere condolences.

Road Still Unimproved.
