The Hungarian Peace Treaty provides that Hungary shall formally waive claim to Fiume and all former Austrio-Hungarian territories awarded to Italy, Rumania and Jugo Slavia and Czecho Slovakia. Hungary must adhere to the clauses of the Treaty with Austria signed at St. Germain concerning National minorities. Under the terms of the Treaty the Hungarian army must not exceed 35,000 men with guns of not more than 10 centimetre calibre. Hungary assumes tionately the share of the Aus-
