Spread of Bolshevism Alarms Britain.

Another Combat Impending--Hungary Badly Stripped by Treaty--Jugo-Slavs Dissatisfied With Fiume Settlement--- Mexican Earthquakes Death List 3000--- Internal Disorders in Germany Continue.

A MINOR AFFAIR.

LONDON, Jan. 15. Two Americans were killed, and one wounded, in a clash with an armed train of General Semenov's, commander-in-chief of the All-Russian armies, between Lake Balkal and Khududinsk in province of Transbaikalia, according to the correspondent of the Daily Mail at Harbin. The Americans were reported to have captured the train.

A LONG WAIT.

ZURICH, Jan. 15. The Bavarian Premier has written a note of farewell to the Bavarian inhabitants of the Sarre Valley, who will be under French administration for the next fifteen years. The Premier expresses a hope that the referendum, which will be held after ten years, will be given them back faithful citizens to Bavaria.

OFFER ACCEPTED.

LONDON, Jan. 15. Delegates of the Railwaymen's Union have accepted the Government's offer in settlement of the wage demands made by employees in the lower grades of the service, after the close of this morning's meeting of the National Union of Railwaymen. The Conference has decided by a very narrow margin, to accept the Government's offer.

CONSULTING ON MILITARY QUESTIONS.

LONDON, Jan. 15. Winston Churchill, Minister of War; Arthur Hume Long, First Lord of the Admiralty; Baron Beatty, Commander of the Grand Fleet; and Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, Chief of the Imperial Staff, left London for Paris tonight to consult with Premier Lloyd George and other British officials there on important naval and military questions.

THE BOLSHEVIK MENACE.

LONDON, Jan. 15. Before peace with Germany is a week old the British public has been brought sharply against the possibility of another war. Winston Churchill, Secretary for War, Arthur Hume Long, First Lord of the Admiralty, Baron Beatty, Commander of the Grand Fleet, and Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, Chief of the Imperial Staff, left tonight, having been hurriedly summoned to Paris for a consultation with Premier Lloyd George and other British officials there, on important military and naval matters. The summons is inevitably connected with the public mind with the semi-official statement published to-day calling attention to the threatening situation in the Middle East as a result of Bolshevik military successes, which

FIUME QUESTION SETTLED.

PARIS, Jan. 15. The Temps says to-day that Italy has waived sovereignty over Fiume and also waived the question of the demobilization of Sebenico. The port of Fiume and railways will be placed under the authority of the League of Nations, the newspaper declares.

HEAVY DEATH TOLL IN MEXICO.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 15. Reports slowly coming in from the eastern section of the state of Huehuetlan tell of terrible loss of life in that region as a result of the earthquake on January 3. Further east in the State of Vera Cruz the death toll seems to be growing. Reports from Coahuila state that the number of dead in that city and in the surrounding villages is more than three thousand. The lake which inundated the village of Barranca Grande was caused by a mountain collapsing and damming the river.

LAKE CARRIERS HAD POOR YEAR.

DETROIT, Jan. 15. A series of adverse circumstances contributed to a generally unsatisfactory season for the fleet of 385 ships of the Lake Carriers' Association during last year, according to the annual report submitted to the Association's convention here to-day. The fleet, which at the beginning of the season consisted of 1,932,830 tons, lost sixteen vessels through sales, withdrawal from membership, or destruction by the elements.

COMES VIA BELGIN.

LONDON, Jan. 15. A wireless despatch from Berlin says that riots and mutinies have broken out among French naval forces and troops at Toulon, the military and naval port of France on the Mediterranean. The uprisings were caused by insufficient bread supplies, the message asserts.

MAYOR OF CORK ASSAULTED.

CORK, Jan. 15. W. F. O'Connor, Lord Mayor of Cork, was attacked by a party of men while returning last night from a meeting of demobilized soldiers. The Mayor was knocked down and assaulted. A couple of former soldiers rescued him from his assailants. The attack is attributed to the Mayor's opposition to the election policy of the Sinn Fein organization.

JELICOE EN ROUTE TO TRINIDAD.

KINGSTON, Ja., Jan. 15. Admiral Jellicoe and Sir Robert Borden, who arrived in Jamaica Tuesday, for a brief visit on the southward journey, resumed their voyage to-day. The next stop of the battle cruiser New Zealand, on board which they are travelling, will be the island of Trinidad.

BERLIN QUIET.

LONDON, Jan. 15. Berlin was comparatively quiet Wednesday, according to a wireless despatch from the German capital. The large factories were working normally and the railways and tram service were not hampered.

SIMS AFTER DANIELS.

MONTREAL, Jan. 15. A special despatch to the Montreal Gazette from Washington says, the feud between Secretary of Navy Daniels and Admiral Sims has broken out again with greater intensity. Admiral Sims has written to Daniels a second letter described as thoroughly critical of the Secretary's administration from its beginning to the present time, but particularly during the war.

FEAR DISORDER MAY EXTEND.

LONDON, Jan. 15. Fears are expected in diplomatic despatches received here that the Berlin imbroglio spread to Vienna through the agency of the communists; this elements using the recent Berlin disorders to inflame masses by representing those killed as martyrs to the cause of the people.

PREPARING FOR TROUBLE.

LONDON, Jan. 15. German troops were marched to Leipzig on Tuesday where they occupied squares and public buildings, according to a Berlin despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company to-day. Machine guns were placed in commanding positions.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS IN IRELAND.

LONDON, Jan. 15. Local Government elections take place to-day throughout Ireland. The results will be declared Saturday night.

WOULD PROBABLY ACCEPT.

LONDON, Jan. 15. Nothing yet has been decided regarding former Premier Asquith contesting Paisley, vacant through the death of Sir John McCallum, although he would probably accept the invitation from the Liberal Association in the constituency itself.

At the City Hall.

The weekly meeting of the City Council took place yesterday, at which the Councillors being present.

A letter was read from the Deputy Minister of Justice and the Solicitor, dealing with the title to land formerly used for railway purposes in the East End. The Minister of Justice was of opinion the question of ownership should be submitted for a declaration of the Supreme Court as to the rights of the parties in the property. The Solicitor held that as the property was Imperial, the Council had no power to open streets nor impose the cost of mains, etc., on the owners. Ordered that the Solicitor be asked how this matter can be brought before the Supreme Court.

The Colonial Secretary intimated that a guarantee had been sent to the Royal Bank for a loan of \$20,000 to pay for improvements under the Act of 1915.

The Reid Co. stated the returns for the street railway for 1919 were \$64,810.60.

The Truckmen's Union notified the Council that Truckmen at Council work would have to paid \$8.00 per day.
