Some time ago a heavy paving-stone began to rise on a pathway in a country town, and when it was removed to see what had caused the distrubance a mushroom was found growing underneath. Soft and pliable as the fungus might seem, it was more powerful than the dead weight of the stone, which must have been half a hundredweight.

Tree Lifts a Ton.
