Love-Sick Boy Kills Parents.

After 24 hours of merciless grilling, Richard Chaplain, 22 years old and a veteran of the world war, broke down in his cell at Saginaw. Mich. and confessed to the murder of his father and mother so that he might inherit their \$1000,000 estate and marry a 17-yearold school teacher, Clara Humpert, with whom he was desperately in love. Up to last week Champlain had stubbornly stuck to his story that he woke up, finding the house ablaze, had leaped out of an upper-story window to save his own life. The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Champlain, fully dressed. were found in their beds with their skulls fractured, three days ago. A blood-stained hammed was found in the pocket of young Champlain's automobile and a bloody hankerchief was hidden in the tonneau.

"How did you kill them?" he was asked.

"I shot them," was his reply. "Why?"

"I came home from Clara's house and quarelled with my mother and father. They didn't want me to go with Clara, objecting to her religion. I told them she was a nice girl, and I loved her. My folks told me to leave her alone. I went in the next room and got a revolver and shot them dead, and placed their bodies on the bed. Then I went to Saginaw and soon returned to the farm and fired the house to cover the crime."

A Famous Court Official.

Sir Spencer Ponsonby-Fane, Gentleman Usher to the Sword of State and to the King, and Bath King of Arms since 1904, died on Dec. 2, 1915, at his Somersetshire residence, at the age of 91. He was at one time private secretary to Lord Palmerston at the Foreign Office, and became Controller in the Lord Chamberlain's department in 1857, which post he held for over forty-five years. His knowledge of Court ceremonies was unrivalled, and he was invaluable for reference in cases of doubt or difficulty, long after his direct official connection had ceased. His native tact and gentleness carried him over many a rough obstacle, but his fondness for the "soft answer that turneth away wrath" never led him to countenance the slightest departure from the strictest discipline and correctness in the matters for which he was responsible. His faculty for remembe ing names, dates and the minutest details of distant events was extraordinary, and if ever he found his memory slipping he experienced great vexation.


