Hostility to Foreigners
Reaches Acute Stage in China

Besco Proposals for Settlement Sent to International Headquarters--Governor of Maine Tells MacMillan to Claim Arctic Lands for the State--Earl Haig Sails for Canada on His 64th Birthday.

CHINESE THREATEN BOYCOTT.
CANTON, June 19. A general strike and boycott of British, Japanese and United States goods were decided upon at a meeting of students and other Chinese citizens at Kwangtung University yesterday. It is feared anti-foreign outbreaks will follow, and the authorities have taken steps to cope with possible emergencies.

FOREIGNERS TAKING REFUGE ON SHIPS.
SHANGHAI, June 19. According to reports from Chung King, the strikers there are beyond control, and many foreigners have taken refuge aboard foreign gunboats. Two Japanese gunboats have left for Chung King. Severe beatings were received by three foreigners of British, Swedish and Polish nationality.

28 KILLED BY HURRICANE IN RUSSIA.
MOSCOW, June 19. Twenty-eight persons were killed and 130 houses destroyed by a hurricane which swept over the Province of Altai. Reports of other great damage are being received.

MAINE GOVERNOR'S INSTRUCTIONS TO MACMILLAN.
SOUTHPORT, Maine, June 19. Governor Brewster of Maine, tonight authorized Donald MacMillan, who sails for the Arctic tomorrow, to claim any territory he may discover in the Polar regions for the State of Maine. He made this pronouncement at Newagen Inn, at a dinner in honour of the explorer, which was attended by many persons prominent in State and National affairs. Governor Brewster himself arranged for the dinner, and in view of recent press despatches announcing Canada's attitude toward the United States in the matter of claiming any territory discovered by the MacMillan expedition, his announcement was heard with keen interest. By the well-settled principles of international law, says Governor Brewster, discovery is the primary incident in a claim to any land. If the question shall ever arise as to its title, ample constitutional provision is made for its determination by the constitution.

MURDOCK BELIEVES EARLY SETTLEMENT POSSIBLE.
SYDNEY, June 19. The British Empire Steel Corporation's proposition for a settlement of the present tie-up in the Nova Scotia coal fields, has been forwarded to International President John L. Lewis at Indianapolis by District 28 Executive.

DRUMHELLER, Alberta, June 19. The Drumheller miners, at their meeting Thursday, decided to break away from the United Mine Workers of America and to form their own organization and make their own arrangements. They did not like the agreement made for them at Calgary by the organization officials. A formal ballot will be taken Monday.

AUSTRALIA NOT CONSULTED.
MELBOURNE, June 19. Premier Bruce, of Australia, told Parliament Australia has not been asked to become a party to the security pact proposed by Germany and that the Government is yet to determine whether Australia will adhere to the proposed agreement.

ASCOT WINNERS.
ASCOT, England, June 19. Somerville Tattersall's Hurstwood won the Hardwicke Stakes for two thousand pounds sterling with extras, run here to-day. Madame Calmann's Tournesol was second and Lord Rosebery's Black was third. Seven ran.

HAIG SAILS FOR CANADA.
LONDON, June 19. Field Marshal Earl Haig, celebrated his 64th birthday to-day by sailing on the Letitia for Canada, accompanied by Countess Haig and daughter. He is President of the British Empire Service League, and will address the British Empire League at its meeting in Ottawa shortly after his arrival there.

CONGRATULATED AMUNDSEN.
OSLO, June 19. King Haakon of Norway sent a telegram of welcome to Captain Amundsen, Polar explorer. "The Queen and I bid you and your companions welcome home and thank you for your feat and for bringing honor to the name of Norway." The Norwegian Parliament to-day also sent a telegram of thanks and congratulations to Amundsen. The streets of Oslo are gaily decorated in celebration of the return of the explorers. Various Municipal and Government authorities and many Institutions and Associations telegraphed congratulations.

BELGIAN DECLARED WINNER.
BRUSSELS, June 19. The aero clubs to-day declared the Belgian, M. Venstra, winner of the

recent Gordon Bennett Cup balloon race.

REDUCES PRICE OF NEWSPRINT.
MONTREAL, June 19. H. Biermans, President of the Belgian-Canadian Paper Company, has advised the Company's customers that in renewing contracts for 1926, the price of newsprint will be reduced from \$75.00 to \$65.00.

VICTORIA, B.C., June 19. Owen B. Baker, and Harry Sowash, charged with the murder of Captain W. J. Gillis, following the hi-jacking of the launch, Beryl G., near Signy Island, on September 15th, last, were found guilty by a jury shortly after noon to-day. Mr. Justice Morrison sentenced them to be hanged on Sept. 4th next.

\$1,600,000 FOR NEW DOCK AT EQUI-MAULT.
OTTAWA, June 19. The House of Commons to-day passed a vote of \$1,600,000 for construction of the Esquimault dry dock.
