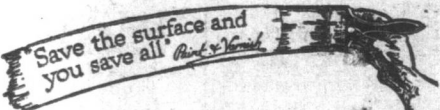

Unemployed May Replace British Seamen on Strike

Italian Submarine Lost With All Hands— Canadian Bond Issue Over-Subscribed in New York—Canadian General Election Believed Certain.

SEAMEN'S STRIKE LIKELY TO FAIL
LONDON, Sept. 2. The indications are that the unskilled seamen's strike in the British fleet may not become widespread owing to the threats of the shipowners to take new crews from the unemployed flocking to the ports hoping for jobs. It is expected that the Atlantic and other liners scheduled to sail today will depart on time. The strike in London is declared a fait accompli. An additional 45,000 British unemployed during the week ending August 24. The total registered unemployed was 1,343,700.

ITALIAN SUBMARINE LOST

Shortage Balloons to Conserve Gasoline
"Breathing losses" of 50,000,000 gallons of gasoline yearly will be checked by the use of balloons to store vapor, it was reported to the American Chemical Society at its recent meeting in Los Angeles. This method was described in a paper prepared by Messrs. Wilson, Atwell, Brown and Chenick, chemists of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, who asserted that it is the first to prove economically effective in preventing evaporation losses from gasoline stored during winter and spring in anticipation of the tremendous summer demand. They are thus quoted in a press bulletin issued by the society (New York):

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Chemists throughout the industry have been alive to the importance of this problem, but its practical solution has proven very difficult. Considerable improvement has been made by substituting steel for wooden roofs and making them tight enough to keep wind from blowing through, and these improvements have been quite generally made.

"There still remained, however, the 'breathing loss,' amounting to over 3 per cent. a year. This is due to the daily changes in temperature, the heat of the sun during the day expanding the air above the gasoline and vaporizing enough gasoline to expel, through the vent pipe which must be provided, several thousand cubic feet of rich gasoline-saturated air from a modern storage tank holding around 3,000,000 gallons.

"At night the vapor space cools and is condensed, and from it have been fresh air, which in turn becomes saturated with gasoline and is breathed out the next day. While spraying or insulating the tanks and various other methods have been used to reduce this loss, no satisfactory and economical way of preventing it has been found until now.

"A special gasoline-proof fabric has been developed, and from it have been constructed large balloons or 'breather bags' which are hung in galvanneled iron buildings and connected to the vapor space of the storage tank.

"When the gasoline-saturated air in the top of the tank expands it merely goes into the breather bag while the temperature is rising, and is sucked back again when the tank cools off at night, thus preventing any loss. The breather bag is weighted by a special system which keeps the pressure in the top of the tank substantially balanced at all times, preventing losses through small openings which it is hard to eliminate entirely.

"One 18,000 cubic feet balloon will care for two or more large gasoline storage tanks, and save about 14,000 gallons of gasoline per month under average weather conditions. Automatic release and intake valves are provided to care for pumping to and from the tank, or exceptionally large 'breathers' beyond the capacity of the balloon."

Two of these balloons have been in use for over two years by the Standard Oil Company of Indiana without, it was said, showing signs of deterioration, and during the past winter and spring over sixty balloons have been installed by that Company to protect all its large gasoline storage tanks as well as a number of working tanks. The method, it was declared, will also prevent losses of the gasoline fraction from stored crude oil, and of other volatile liquids, such as benzol. One of the principal problems involved was making a fabric which would be impervious to gasoline vapor. All ordinary gas-tight fabrics, such as rubber, oilcloth, etc., allowed large quantities of gasoline to escape, but the new fabric, made of closely woven cloth impregnated with a mixture con-
