DO YOU BELIEVE IN FUNERALS?

Do you believe in funerals? They are for the living. They are an outlet for emotion. They are something to do. Something to do. When a friend dies, all your affection for him or her focuses in pain that he has slipped away and you cannot tell how much he meant. If there were only something you could do and the funeral is in answer to that wish. It gives you a chance to pay a final tribute of respect and affection. "But," says someone, "funerals are so hard on the family." They are, but I think it is a saving hardness. The human ceremony and convention and form of a funeral is a blessed screen between oneself and the stark, final, inhuman fact of death. If there were nothing to do but just sit and contemplate that crushing, unendurable fact, I think madness would come nearer than it does. But because custom has provided us with something to do even though we do not want to do it, even though we bitterly resent it, the doing carries us over a few days.

But they're not for the dead. There was a time when I thoroughly agreed with those people. I still agree with them when they say, "It can't possibly do the dead any good to do all that for them after they are gone." But as one grows older one is apt to find out that when customs have kept their vitality through centuries there is something that answers to human needs in them, however foolish and even harmful they may seem in some aspects.

We May Need Harrowing. "Harrowing" is the word a friend

of mine always uses about funerals. He doesn't think they ought to be allowed because they harrow people's feelings so. I wonder if it is necessarily a bad thing for people to have their feelings harrowed? The farmer harrows the ground to prepare it for his seed. Aren't there plenty of hearts that would not be the worse for a harrowing now and then? Hearts hardened with materialism and self-absorption, hearts too seldom watered by the mists of tenderness. Of course there are people to whom funerals represent an orgy of emotionalism, people who have a morbid interest in all the details and really enjoy a good cry. They bring the sordid ugly element into such ceremonies. But there is good and bad in every human custom. It's just a question in each case which outweighs which.

The Russian Complex

Their whole political bias is definitely determined to-day by their judgement of England's attitude. They see the Anglo-Russian differences which remained unswayed after the war suddenly coming to a head in Asia. It matters little that, officially, Russia keeps apart from the revolutionary agitation in the Far East, or that the agitation in China are nationalistic in character. Moscow is now a-days the hearth of a universal revolutionary flame. It cannot work as an olive branch on England that a college for Chinese students in at the present time being established in Moscow. There are no indications that Russia is exerting a soothing influence in the east. Rather, she is playing there the most dangerous diplomatic game. Moscow sees in the Conservative British Government the strongest opponents to Russian State policy. It is England's evident intention to be on better terms with Persia and the Baltic States and to make her feet at home in Baltic waters, which has provoked in Moscow the immediate desire to seek peace with these neighbors. This desire corresponds with the eastern aims of Russian diplomacy. —Frankfort, Zeitungs.

Britain Should Help

Trade by Preference

FRANK STATEMENT BY AMERICAN DINER GIVEN BY LARSEN

LONDON. — Preferential trade for the products of the Dominion the building up of Imperial trade advocated by Rt. Hon. L. S. M.P., Secretary for Dominion Affairs in proposing the toast to the "Dominion of Canada" at a dinner given by Hon. P. C. Larkin, High Commissioner for Canada in the Imperial Agricultural Products Department of the Ministry of Agriculture at Ottawa.

Mr. Amery said that Canada destined to become a great nation, but for many a long year interests would lie in primary production. The most effective way of opening inter-imperial trade was legislation, which would give a finite preference to the goods of the Dominions. Some later the obvious common sense of such legislation would commend itself to the country and to every citizen of the Empire. It was true that duties recently imposed were parts of the Empire more than aid, but it must not be assumed Canada did not benefit. Under McKenna duties this country over £600,000 of Canadian cars; and then we took £100,000 of Canadian tobacco in addition to this policy, much might be done by publicizing the policy to promote Empire trade. The £1,000,000 which the Empire Committee has allocated for this purpose.
