Empire-buildin must no longer be left to the politician and statesman. Financiers, too, were responsible, declared the speaker.

He discussed the many resources of the Peace River country in its relation to future British investments, and to illustrate the evil of cosmopolitan investments referred to the Japanese Empire's economic geography, which he compared not with the British Empire, nor even with Canada, but most unfavorably with the prov ince of British Columbia. He deprecated the amateurish spiri of the British capitalists, who placed their money in the hands of country without economic security, to say nothing of the fact that the money was building up the keenest business competitor Great Britain had in the Far East.
