ROSENTHAL'S MURDERERS HUNTED DOWN

New York, August 6.—Word was momentarily expected today at police headquarters of the capture of Harry Horowitz, alias "Gib the Blood" and "Lefty Louie," two of the men wanted for the killing of the gambler, Herman Rosenthal. The men are being hunted in the city and mountains by a score of Central Office detectives and a squad of deputy sheriffs.

FEAR ATTACK UPON THE KING OF ITALY

Rome, Aug. 6.—Police preparations were begun today to guard King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Victoria against another attempt at assassination when they go to the cathedral Monday to attend the mass held there annually on the anniversary of King Humbert's murder in an apartment. HUNDRED MEN BATTLE TO SAVE COMRADES

Uniontown, Pa., Aug. 6.—At Lemont mine, 100 men are battling for the lives of three miners believed to be water-logged in the pits. The trio were caught 1,800 feet from the mouth of the mine and may be staying off death in a gallery leading upwards. At the water's edge far down in the shaft the rescuers fight the flood back inch by inch. The biggest pumps of the mine are coupled up and firemen feeding the boilers that drive the pumps are relieved hourly. Hope is dead at nearby Superbia mine, where fourteen or fifteen miners were drowned Wednesday and while the rescue work is being pushed rapidly, it may be two months before the dead men cling to the entrance of the shaft, alternately bemoaning their plight and berating the mine owners for not warning the men in time. Thirty children, orphaned by the disaster, are being temporarily cared for at the company store.

AUBURN POLICE TAKE ONE OF TWO SUSPECTS

Auburn, N. Y., August 6.—A well dressed stranger whom the police suspect of being either Harry Horowitz, "Gib the Blood" or "Lefty Louie," wanted in New York city in connection with the Rosenthal murder, was in jail here. The man and a companion were about to board a westbound train here when arrested. The companion occupied the prisoner, who says his name is Doran, claims to be a restaurant worker on his way from Oswego to Geneva.

Seattle Plans a Stadium Seattle, Aug. 6.—Seattle will have a large concrete stadium costing more than \$100,000 near the centre of the city completed before the opening of 1913. If plans made last night at a meeting of the Order of Friends of Seattle are carried out, an effort will be made at once to make the necessary money.
