From this particular dairy showed it contained an unusually high per cent of other bacteria though none of the bacilli coli communit were present.

The result of the milk and water tests is to settle beyond reasonable doubt that the prevalence of typhoid fever in Calgary is due to the open closet, lack of proper sewage connection, accumulation of garbage and other filth, furnishing a breeding ground for flies, and failure to protect food against flies.

As typhoid fever requires from six to eight and ten weeks to run its course the hospital cases are sadly overworked with the hospital cases.

One Third of Cases from Outside. The hospital reports for August show that about one-third of the cases for this month are brought in from the outside.

It is obvious that every citizen should take the utmost precaution to protect food from flies, and above all, to keep the house and yard free from manure piles which are fertile breeding places for the deadly fly.
