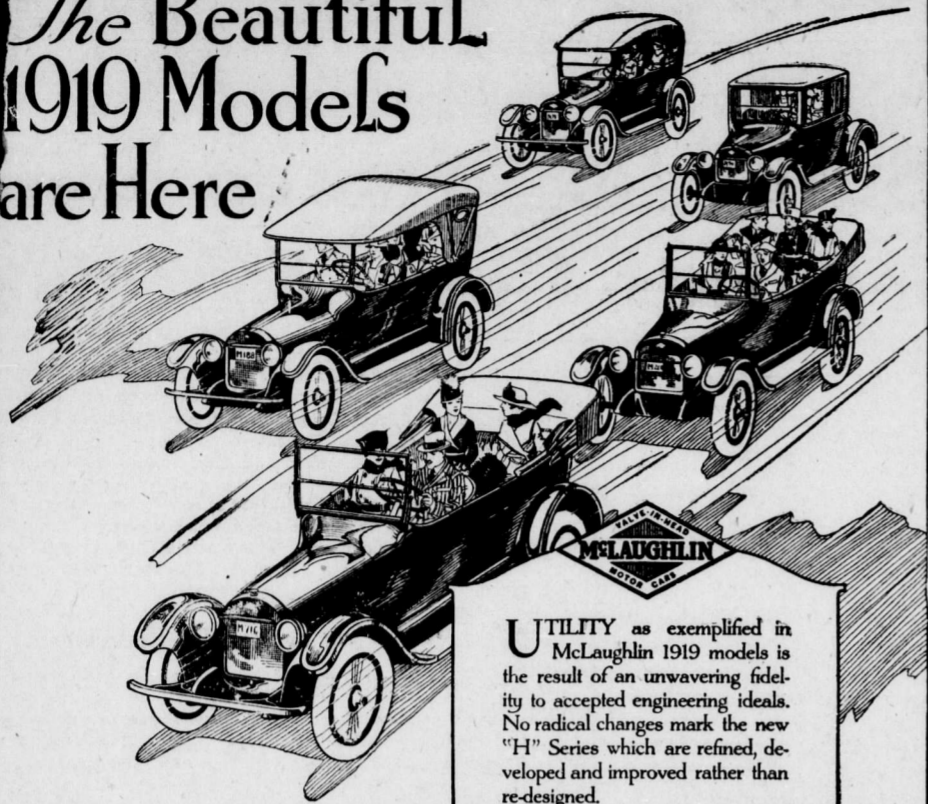

## VERDICT FOR \$1,300 AGAINST COUNTY

### Bad Road North of Pt. Burwell Cause

Judgement was given by Mr. Justice Chute Thursday morning for the plaintiffs to the amount of \$1,300, and the costs of their action in the damage suit brought against the County of Elgin by Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Morrick, and their son, David Morrick, of Norfolk County, following an automobile accident on the county road just north of Port Burwell on August 18, 1918. The damages allowed by his Lordship were awarded as follows: Aaron Morrick, \$500; Irene Morrick, \$600; for the damages caused to the automobile, \$200. His Lordship did not think David Morrick who asked for \$500 damages, claiming to have developed nervousness, had suffered any appreciable damages. In respect to the damages awarded the other two plaintiffs, he declared that if there was an error as to his assessment, it would be that it had been too low.

### Correct Idea Not Given.

His Lordship accepted the evidence given by Engineer Marston, of Norfolk county, and other witnesses for the plaintiffs, in respect to the condition of the edges of the road, against the evidence of Good Roads Superintendent Pineo and other witnesses for the defence. His Lordship stated that he did not accept all the

evidence given by Mr. Pineo, not meaning that the statements were untrue, but that Mr. Pineo had not given the court the correct idea.

A stay of 13 days was permitted for the execution of judgement.

The decision was received with un-concealed surprise by the majority of those in attendance at the interesting case. It is rumored that it has set a precedent for other actions. In fact it is openly reported that the action against the county by Mr. and Mrs. Snider, the other occupants of the Morrick car, was being held in abeyance until the outcome of this case was learned. A writ has already been issued against the county in the Snider suit for damages.

Mr. Snider is compelled to use crutches since the accident, and is in a bad state of health.

## CANADA TO HAVE NEW ONE CENT PIECE

Sir Thomas White introduced a resolution in the House last week, which was passed unanimously, and which has for its purpose to provide for the issue of a new one cent piece, smaller than the present coin. He said he had had this under construction before the war, but the pressure of other business had caused delay. He said the weight of the present coin was eighty-seven and a half grains and the new coin would be fifty grains. The present coin weighs

eighty to the pound, while the new coin will weigh one hundred and forty to the pound. It will approximate the American bronze cent, which weighs forty-eight grains. It will be a little larger than the ten cent silver piece, and thinner, so that it will be easily distinguished by the touch. The old one cent piece will continue in force, and the new one will be issued by proclamation.

Sir Thomas explained that it was not intended to withdraw the present one cent piece from circulation, but as they became smooth and worn, they would be redeemed. This would take a long time. Sir Thomas then introduced a bill based on the resolution.

## WORTH REMEMBERING

Equal parts of ammonia and spirits of turpentine will remove paint.

When baby falls and gets a bump, put butter on the bruise, and it will not turn black and blue.

To drive away red ants, break up a fresh cake of yeast and sprinkle the pieces with sugar.

Mildew can be removed by rubbing with green tomato and salt. Afterwards expose to the sun.

If stove blacking is mixed with strong black coffee. The blacking will stick closer and polish last longer.

Cranberry poultice is said to be good for erysipelas.

Warm bran and corn meal will clean furs. Give them a good, brisk rubbing in the meal, then hang in the air but not in the sun.

After handling codfish, onions or any odorous substance, ground mustard rubbed on the hands after bathing them and while they are damp or moistened with water, will remove all odors. Cold water is better than warm water after handling anything that has strong odor.

part of French and English troops." Rev. Hanley failed to observe any evidence of underfeeding on the part of the German people. "I did not find the French in want, either," he said. "In fact the only country where I observed food regulation to the point where it represented actual hardship, was in England. England denied herself that France and Italy might not suffer."

The chaplain praised the courage of the colored troops. The Germans feared them most of all. The black brethren, however, were no good as trench fighters. Led by white officers they did not like standing still. It they were ready to go anywhere, but was forwards or backwards with them.

There was one job, however, at which the negro trooper balked, and that was burying the dead. I started out one night with a burial party of 250 men and when daylight broke there were only fifty left.

## Observes War Prisoners

"At Verdun I witnessed the return of allied prisoners of war. The Russians appeared to be the least affected by their detention. The Americans and British were emaciated, weak and haggard. I believe this was due, in part to their mental attitude, rather than to physical suffering, however. The Russian submitted patiently to captivity, while it was galling to the English and the Americans. By this I do not mean, however that Germany treated her war captives with any consideration. Her crime in this regard will never be forgotten. She must answer to civilization for her treatment of captive fighters and enslaved peoples. I shall never forget the spectacle of five hundred Belgian children who, liberated by the armistice passed through our lines. They had been working in German factories and they were more shadows than children. Starved, half-clothed, spiritless, they were a pathetic sight. It made a man see red.

Rev. Hanley declared that his sympathies were with every American boy away from home. He, however, urged that his grumbling be not too seriously considered.

"The American soldier is a born knocker. He's not considered to be healthy, unless he is critical. He believes that he must kick to show that he is alive and they are not forced to go far to find something at which to launch a protest. Naturally they are out of their element in France. They want to get home and they are critical of everything and everybody in France. They are alien to the French ways and even to some of the customs of the Tommie. The result is hostility and friction. I did not stop at Brest but I do know that hundreds of thousands of men cannot be poured through a town and not it was, and even though a truce has been developed undesirable features."

"War is everything Sherman said been signed France is still an arena of war and the conditions which make war so frightful still operate to make life unpleasant for the Yank abroad."

In conclusion he praised the work of the different war camp activities and stated that in the crucible of war that religious differences had been largely dissolved.

"From the heat of a common struggle has arisen a new brotherhood bigger and finer than anything the world has ever seen."

"What we need even to-day is keener understanding and a fairer tolerance," he said.
