In the Dining-Room.

FRIDAY, NOV. 26.

BREAKFAST—Baked apples. Egg and veal hash. Spanish toast. Oatmeal gems. Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Sausage rolls. Sweet potatoes, baked. Bread and butter. Stewed prunes. Tea.

DINNER—Turkey bone soup. Cuck-a-la-Creme. Celery 'on toast. Mashed potatoes. Creamed corn. Banana custard. Coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Turkey-Bone Soup—Take the bones and scraps left from roast turkey, chicken, or any kind of game. Lay aside any nice pieces, no matter how small. Remove all the stuffing and keep that by itself. Break the bones and pack them closely in a kettle. Cover with cold water. Add one small onion, sliced; the other stalks and leaves of a head of celery; one teaspoonful of salt and a tablespoonful of pepper. Simmer two or three hours, or until the bones are clean. Strain and remove the fat. Put the liquor on to boil again, and for every quart of liquor allow three tablespoonfuls of salt and one teaspoonful of pepper. Add one cup of cold meat cut into small pieces and half a cup of the stuffing. Or omit the stuffing and thicken the soup with flour. Simmer until the meat is tender, and serve at once. This is much better than to boil the meat bones and stuffing together. In that case, the stuffing absorbs the oil and gives a very strong flavor to the soup.

Tomatoes (a pint) to a quart of stock make a twelve-pound turkey should furnish stock for three dinners. Do not throw them away until every bit of substance has been drawn out.

Cuck-a-la-Creme—Take one quart of pieces of cold fish, either boiled or baked. Put one quart of milk, with one blade of mace, a sprig of parsley and a bay leaf into the milk boiler to boil. Stir together one tablespoonful of cornstarch and one ounce of butter. Remove the bay leaf, mace and parsley from the milk and stir in cornstarch and butter. Add also to the milk the beaten yolks of two eggs, one teaspoonful salt and one-half teaspoonful pepper. Put a layer of fish in a baking dish, then a layer of sauce, and so continue until all is used, having sauce on top. Sprinkle over the top with bread crumbs and put in the oven to brown. Serve in baking dish.

HOCKEY.

WINNIEPEG TEAM TO VISIT ON TORONTO.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 24.—Matters are beginning to move in hockey circles once more. The Winnipeg club, while not able to send a team down to play for the Stanley cup, are nevertheless, going to send their representatives east on a tour, which will last about a month. Their present plans, the team will probably leave the city shortly after the new year, and proceed at once to Quebec. They will play there and then go to Montreal and meet the Victorias and the Montreal team. From there the team goes to Toronto, where two games will be played; then on to Hamilton. Returning eastward, they play at Kingston and Ottawa, and will then proceed to New York, where they will run up against the St. Nicholas and N.Y.A.A. teams. On their way home the Winnipeg will play at Chicago and St. Paul. The Victorias expect to be as strong this year as ever, and will make a desperate effort to regain the championship.

BASEBALL.

THE DOUBLE UMPIRE SYSTEM.
Buffalo Express: Umpire and Referee Tim Hurst is a picturesque figure always. No arbor of the diamond ever possessed a more striking individuality and was the occasion of more or, in fact, near so much interest as the little Irishman from Ashland, Pa. Not less picturesque is Mr. Hurst when talking about between the ropes, watching a pair of fighters with the eyes of a hawk. But if Mr. Hurst is remarkable in fact, he is no less so in report.

Yesterday afternoon a reporter for the Express found Mr. Hurst in his room at the Mansion House. He was alone, but for a great pile of correspondence of wild and weird character, that rose like a barricade between him and the curious eyes of an occasional guest. The collection of letters behind which his owner's face occasionally disappeared as he looked at the pile, seemed to indicate that every fighter in the country wanted a chance to appear before the umpire C. of Buffalo—for a consideration, of course.

Baseball is one of the things that Mr. Hurst puts away with his summer wearing apparel, but he occasionally takes it out for a little airing, but not much more. He was asked yesterday for his opinion on the double umpire system, which the National League has determined to give a trial next summer.

"If the men are honest and capable it is bound to be a success, for the very simple reason that two pairs of eyes are better than one, and especially when stationed at the several points of action. Here's an instance that occurred in the series of games between the Baltimore and Boston clubs at Baltimore, only a few weeks ago. Emmalee, who were umpiring, called at the moment I speak of, was engaged in watching the bases. A player ran down to second accompanied by Emmalee. From the plate it looked as if the batsman had put the ball on the runner, but it was really five or six inches from him. However, the runner's slide carried him over and beyond the base, and stretch as he would, he could not quite reach the bag, although he appeared to the spectators and to me at the plate to have done so. The runner appreciated the fact that with an umpire looking directly down at him, and seeing the three inches of space between his finger tips and the bag, it was useless to make a protest, got up and walked to the bench."

Tom Sloan finished second on Mr. Seymour's 6-year-old Angeline in the race for the Midland counties' handicap plate.

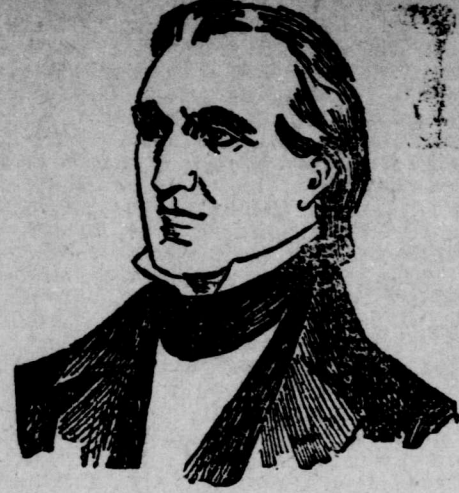
TIPS.
