Wednesday Afternoon.

The continuation of the debate upon the mission committee's report proved the most serious, exciting and eventful of the conference. The discussion began with a good-humored interchange of views for and against Rev. J. R. Gundy's amendment to the clause of the report for a new general board composed of territorial representa-

Rev. J. R. Gundy's amendment was: That the board shall be composed as formerly of the officers of the society, and one minister and one layman from each annual conference, elected by the ministers and laymen voting separately in the annual conferences, also tweive members at large from the General Conference,

Rev. J. R. Gundy, Rev. Dr. Stone, Rev. Dr. Milligan, Principal Shepherd and Rev. F. S. Heustis supported the amendment on the ground that the proposed territorial representation would be as costly and less satisfactory to the membership at large than that prescribed by the amendment. On the vote being reached Rev. J. R. Gundy's amendment was adopted by a

large majority. The foregoing was but preliminary to the forensic battle of the conterence, so far as sensational feelings were concerned. It was launched by an amendment by Rev. F. A. The show of hands left the fate of the amendment in doubt. A rising vote being ordered the vote was 90 for and 73 against, the amendment being carried.

Lengthy debate occurred over an amendment to the report made by Rev. T. G. After the 6 o'clock adjournment the conflict was renewed, the Montreal delegates being greatly aroused and talk of an appeal to the civil courts being publicly made, Judge Deacon attacked the legality of the vote, charging that it was a change in the constitution, needing a two-thirds vote. Dr. Carman declared the conference competent to pass upon the constitutionality of its vote. The legality of the bare majority vote upon the transfer of the power of appointment was sustained by a large majority. A few clauses of the super-

annuation report were adopted. The conference will hold three sessions daily until its close.

That the annual salary of the general superintendent be \$2,500 and \$500 per annum for expenses.

That the General Conference fund treasurer be authorized to borrow moneys necessary for paying claims during the quadrennium.

The finance report was submitted by Mr. R. W. Clarke, secretary. The continuation of the consideration of

the superannuation fund debate was resumed in this clause: The missionary society shall contribute, on behalf of each foreign missionary, in lieu of circuit contributions, the sum of \$70 per annum; and on behalf of each toreign Indian or other ordained missionary (except domestic) the sum of \$50 per

annum. Rev. Dr. Sutherland made a vigorous protest, claiming that the basis of such contributions should be membership, the minimum that of the smallest home con-

The next clause gave rise to considerable debate: "There shall be contributed annually, on behalf of each ordained minister in the active service of the church who is appointed to a position outside the regular pastorate by the society, department, institution or conference he serves, in lieu of circuit contribution, the sum of \$50. This law shall apply to the officers of the General Conterence, the missionary society, the educational society and the superannuation fund; to the principals, professors, teachers and agents of our educational institutions; to conference evangelists, and to all ministers appointed to service outside the

pastorate. Rev. Dr. Burns opposed the clause as discriminating unfairly against those engaged at proprietory institutes who paid for their advertisements in the Guardian, instead of having them inserted d. h. (Laughter.) The clause he described as a premium on beggary.
