THE WEATHER.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 24—11 p.m.—An
important disturbance is situated to-
night over Colorado and Wyoming, another
depression is off the North Pacific coast,
and the pressure is highest over the upper lake
region. A fall of snow has occurred in the
Qu'Appelle Valley and Manitoba and some
snow flurries or light snow falls from the
lakes to the Atlantic.

Edmonton, 22° below—10° below; Calgary,
16° below—8° below; Winnipeg, 24° below—
16° below; Port Arthur, 22° below; Toronto,
18° below—20° below; Montreal, 16°—24°; Quebec, 16°

Two New C. P. R. Steamers To Be
Built.

Ottawa, Nov. 24.—The Canadian
Pacific Railway is arranging to increase the
number of steamers between British
Columbia and the Orient to five. Two new
vessels are to be built at once but as they
cannot be ready for next summer's trade,
two vessels will in the meantime be
chartered. The company intends perfect-
ing this line and getting control of an
Atlantic fast line before doing anything
towards putting on steamers on the Pacific
to Australia.
