

Solicitor-General Curran appeared for the Dominion Government in the Mantoba school case. John S. Ewart, Q.C. for the Roman Catholics, and F. C. Wade, of Winnipeg, for the Mantoba Government. The chief justice said that owing to the absence of Justice Gwynne they could not go on with the school reference, as Justice Sedgewick claimed the right not to sit on it, as he had to deal with it while deputy Minister of Justice. He could not say when the case would be gone on with until he heard from Justice Gwynne. This closed the proceedings as far as this case was concerned.
