But the people took Premier Greenway's advice and sent to Ottawa a man about whose sturdy advocacy of the Liberal policy there could be no doubt, preferring him to the follower of a set of men who in the past have captured and bamboozled every so-called Independent Conservative that has reached the Commons Chamber.
