I am pleased to say, and I suppose you saw, how Lord Roberts gave the Canadians great praise for their work on the march, and the way they bore themselves when in action at Paardeberg in the operations against Gen. Cronje. We lost pretty heavily, 3 killed and 19 wounded in B Company alone. There was a death in our company today, a lad named Adams. He was a son of Sergt .-Major Adams, of the London police force. He died about noon, and we bury him tomorrow morning. I think it was enteric fever that carried him off so suddenly. They have established hospitals all through the city, and they are taxed to their utmost in looking after the sick alone, as all the wounded have been sent down country as soon as we arrived here. We hear a lot of rumors as to what is going to happen. There is talk that the general advance is on the 24th of this month, but I guess there is no one knows but Gen. Roberts, and I don't think he tells many of his plans to the general pub-We have a lot of troops around here. I guess there must be 65,000 soldiers camped here. Our brigade is commanded by Gen. Smith-Dorrien, and he is a very fine mam. I think he is the most humane general officer out here, as he is strictly against sacrificing the lives of his men more than is neces-
