FRIDAY'S CYCLONE

Leaves Over 500 Families Homeless—29 Persons Killed.

MERIDIAN, Miss., March 7.—Over 300 families have been rendered homeless and destitute in two districts of Lauderdale county by Friday's cyclone. Reports from the farming districts reveal a very distressing state of affairs. Farmers are left penniless, with not an ounce of food or raiment to clothe their families. In many instances their horses and mules were killed, and they are without means of cultivating their crops. Two more of the injured at Tombs died yesterday, making the death toll 29 as far as known.

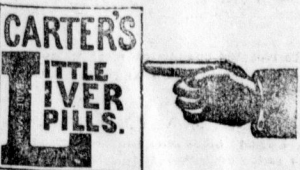

Our World's Fair Letter.

Seeing the Show From a Revolving Wheel 250 Feet in Diameter.

Methodists Apply for More Space at the World's Fair.

Queen Victoria Will Loan Windsor Castle Tapestries to Chicago—Programme of the Congress of Missions.

(From Our Special Correspondent.)

CHICAGO, March 3.—Two hundred men are now employed on the foundations that are to support the 4,300 tons weight of the Ferris wheel, one of the World's Fair attractions in Midway Plaisance. Imagine a wheel 250 feet in diameter, and around it, suspended between the two towers, 36 passenger cars, each larger than an ordinary passenger coach, and with a seating capacity of 60 persons each. Imagine this great wheel, with its living freight, amounting to a total of 2,160 persons, slowly revolving. Imagine the sensation of being carried up 250 feet on one side and being lowered on the other, and of gaining during the trip a complete view of the grounds and of a large portion of Lake Michigan to boot. That is the idea of the Ferris wheel in a nutshell.

The entire structure is of steel, and somewhat resembles a huge bicycle wheel revolving between two towers. The wheel practically consists of two wheels on the same axle, a distance of 284 feet apart, and held together by bars of steel. Between the two wheels, and suspended from steel trussion pins, are the 36 passenger cars. These cars are constructed of wood and steel, upholstered, and have a weight of nineteen tons each. The cars are so fastened to the wheel that at whatever height it remains in a horizontal position. In groups on the rods around the crown of the wheel will be arranged 3,000 incandescent lights, with globes of various colors. These will be alternately extinguished and relighted at night as the wheel revolves, thus producing a spectacle calculated to excite envy in the mind of a pyrotechnic. The platforms are located on both sides of the lower part of the wheel, and six cars can be loaded and unloaded at once. The time required for one complete trip will be twenty minutes, and this will give the passengers two complete revolutions of the wheel.

The total expenditure involved in the construction and erection of the wheel will reach \$400,000. The inventor is G. W. G. Ferris, an engineer and bridge builder of Pittsburg.

Representatives of the Methodist Church called on Director-General Davis yesterday and asked for an increased allotment of space. They were chaperoned by Solomon Thayer, and were from Cincinnati, Chicago and the Far South. They called on the director-general in the interest of an exhibit for Southern colleges. They wanted 1,600 feet of space for the Methodist schools in South Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee. Colonel Davis could afford the delegation but little comfort. He merely said that in case space was vacated by other applicants it would be given for the cause presented by the delegation.

Queen Victoria's first cablegram in relation to the Fair was received by President Higginbotham yesterday, in which she cordially approves the loan of the tapestries in Windsor Castle. The message was signed by the Queen's private secretary, and the historic tapestries referred to belong to the Queen herself. These hangings will be shown in the Women's Building. Exhibits for the Illinois women continue to arrive in large numbers, and Mrs. Hinde, who has the custody of them at headquarters, is nearly overrun with the accumulated receipts. The sketches show some of the best designs in art and decorative exhibits, together with the custodian and some of her staff.

Members of the Dental Congress, who are now in session at the Grand Pacific, waited on Director-General Davis yesterday to request space for an exhibit in dentistry at the World's Fair. They were referred to Chief Peabody, of the liberal-arts department, who promised to give the matter due consideration.

The preparations for the Congress of Missions, which is to be held in the Art Palace on the lake front, beginning Sept. 28 and ending Oct. 5, are already well advanced. The indications are that the meeting will be the most notable assembly of missionaries ever held. A tentative programme has been prepared, which shows that the mission field, both home and foreign, will be thoroughly covered. Sunday, Oct. 1, is made World's Fair Missionary Day. Three sessions will be held daily, and during the week addresses will be listened to from several of the greatest pulpits orators of the day.

Col. Culp, of the committee on ceremonies, is becoming uneasy lest the invitation which was to be extended to President Cleveland to inaugurate the World's Fair should be delayed. Arrangements have been made to present the invitation to Mr. Cleveland on the afternoon of the 10th. The Chicago printer who is making it has fallen behind, and it is a question whether the invitation will be ready. If not there will be a disappointment, and the committee on ceremonies will be unable to give the President and members of his Cabinet the invitation on the day decided upon.

Twenty-nine different varieties of wood will be worked up into a novel representation of the seal of the State of Washington. This seal will be eight feet square, and it will be 500 feet of lumber. Expert wood carvers are now at work developing the figures on the seal. These include Washington's face and his colonial coat.

Arrangements have been perfected by G. W. Sheldon & Co., custom house brokers, to open an office for the transaction of business at Jackson Park. The offices will be opened this week, with Carl Werninghoff in charge.

The council of administration yesterday granted a location for the immense kitchen of the Wellington Catering Company. It is 125x325 feet, and on a line with Sixty-Sixth street, near Stony Island avenue.

A delegation of Fort Wayne railroad men visited Jackson Park yesterday and called on Director-General Davis.

The Crompton loom works have been granted the privilege of selling the product of the machinery as shown in machinery hall.

The additional sum of \$300,000 has been appropriated by the New York Senate for the World's Fair purposes.

C. Du Pasquier has the concession for the sale of reproductions in miniature of the Eiffel tower. W. & C. will offer for sale illustrative views of portions of the exposition. So this matchless fair will be an inspiration to a greater effort and a guidepost to greater excellence. You will do yourself an injustice, a wrong, if you do not come to the fair. It will be one of the greatest landmarks on the highway of progress. It will be the turning point at which almost numberless individuals will round into a better and more aspiring path.

Late Canadian News

Room in the Molasses Market—G. T. R. Earnings.

At Sheet Harbor, N. S., Capt. Fred. Henry committed suicide by hanging himself with a skate strap.

The Montreal Board of Trade has adopted resolutions favoring the establishing of a fast Atlantic steamship service to Montreal. Hon. Neil McLeod, ex-Premier of Prince Edward Island, has been appointed county judge of Prince county, in place of the late Judge Macdonald.

Grand Trunk Railway earnings for the week ending March 4, 1893, \$567,691; corresponding period in 1892, \$374,650; decrease, 1893, \$6,939.

At Westmoreland County Court to-day Mrs. H. T. Stevens was charged with manslaughter. Immense crowds in attendance, his Honor Judge Landry in charge. It is understood that Mr. Birchall, M. P. for Northumberland, will be Speaker of the new Legislature of New Brunswick, which is to meet at Fredericton on Thursday.

Another electric company, composed of Montreal, Toronto and New York capitalists, is contemplated to run an electric railway to Montreal. The capital required is \$8,000,000.

Eugene Beaudoin, the 22-year-old son of Joseph Beaudoin, of the Department of Agriculture, was found at 7 o'clock Tuesday morning in the Ottawa River, frozen into the ice.

The Bradford City Council fixed the rate of taxes for 1893 at 17 mills. To this will be added the frontage and water taxes. The late annexed section will be fixed at 12 mills.

At Sweetsburg, Que., Jonas Martin, indicted for manslaughter, was found guilty. He is sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.

Tuesday afternoon John MacTavish, a farmer from North Gower, about 65 years of age, dropped dead in the McKay Milling Company's office, Ottawa, while receiving payment for a load of oats.

The price of molasses will likely go still higher before it falls. Late advices from Barbadoes, Antigua and Porto Rico, are that Barbadoes is selling at 19 cents per wine gallon, f. o. b. The crop will not be over half that of last year.

Rev. Mr. Hopeck, of Orangeville, has signified his intention not to accept a call from Chalmers' Church, which should one be extended to him. This will be a disappointment to many, as a very large majority of the congregation were in his favor.

According to Bradstreet's the bank clearings at Halifax, Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton aggregated \$76,577,000 for February this year, as compared with \$68,479,000 in February, 1892, an increase of nearly 12 per cent, due almost exclusively to Montreal.

FOR CHURCH UNION.

Unanimous Action of the Toronto Presbytery.

TORONTO, March 7.—The Toronto Presbytery to-day unanimously adopted a memorial to the General Assembly, asking for the appointment of a committee to confer with the Congregation Union on the question of union of the two denominations.

COMPLEXION OF CONGRESS.

Democrats Control the Senate and Have Eighty Majority in the House.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 7.—The present roll call of the Senate shows 44 Democrats, 38 Republicans, 1 Populist, 1 Independent, 1 Farmers' Alliance and 3 vacancies. Two of the vacancies have been temporarily filled by the appointment of Beckwith (Dem.) from Wyoming, and Leamante (Rep.) from Montana, but should all three vacancies be eventually filled by the election of Republicans, which is barely possible, the Senate (even with the combined forces of the Populists) would still be a tie, with Vice-President Stevenson holding the controlling vote.

The composition of the House as shown by unofficial returns is: Democrats 217, Republicans 128, Third party 8 and vacancies 2. The Democrats thus have a majority of 80 over all.

The first meeting of Mr. Cleveland's Cabinet was held this afternoon and lasted something more than two hours. All the members were present. The Hawaiian annexation and the financial situation were touched upon, but the greater part of the time was taken up with a consideration of the question of appointments, particularly those of assistants to the various Cabinet officers.

The Hop Market.

ALBANY, N. Y., March 7.—A special to the Journal from Richfield Springs says the hop market is very quiet. The market seems to be on the decline.

How the Gold Goes.

NEW YORK, March 7.—The shipments of gold by to-day's steamers aggregate \$2,300,000. In spite of tight money arrangements are in progress to export \$2,000,000 by Saturday's steamers and \$1,000,000 next Tuesday.

Earthquakes in Oregon.

UNAWULA, Ore., March 7.—A succession of earthquake shocks were felt here Sunday night, spreading fear and consternation among the citizens. Buildings were violently rocked. One of the walls of a large stone warehouse fell and the remaining walls will be to be torn down.

Bank National Fleeced Out of \$6,000. MONTREAL, Que., March 7.—The Banque Nationale authorities are mourning the loss of \$6,030, which was "scooped out" of them by one of their former customers. Louis Riboulet, formerly owner of big cork works in this city, a week ago went to the Banque Nationale with drafts on customers for a large amount. Thinking that Riboulet's customers had authorized him to draw on them, the bank advanced him over \$6,000. Now it appears that the drafts were unauthorized and the man is missing.

WINDSOR'S BANK ROBBERY.

Judge Horne Finds the Prisoner Leplant Not Guilty.

WINDSOR, March 7.—Judge Horne this morning gave judgment in the Merchants' Bank robbery, in which Zebulon Leplant was charged with stealing \$2,500 from the bank. The judge found that no evidence had been submitted other than the confession. His Honor said it was evident Leplant had been arrested in Detroit for the purpose of getting a confession from him, and the confession could not be received as evidence. He found Leplant not guilty. He also refused to note as requested by the prosecution that there was reasonable or probable cause for Leplant's arrest. Writs are being issued by Leplant against the bank for \$5,000 and against Manager Durand for \$2,000 for malicious arrest and false imprisonment.

Poisoned Porridge—Another Fatality.

KEMPVILLE, Ont., March 7.—To-day, Mrs. John Kennedy, another of the victims of the poisoning by "Rough on Rats" in porridge, died. The two corpses, those of Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy, are now lying in the house.

Closing the Bars at 10 p.m.

WOODSTOCK, March 7.—North Oxford license commissioners some time ago passed a bylaw closing hotel bars at 10 p.m. The liquor men appealed to the court, and decision has been given sustaining the bylaw. The commissioners intend to enforce the bylaw.

Fined \$2,000 for Selling Liquor in Vermont.

PITTSFORD, Vt., March 7.—R. H. Drake, a merchant here, was fined \$1,850 and costs, the whole amounting to about \$2,000, under the prohibitory law for selling liquor. This is one of the heaviest fines ever imposed in the State.

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AN AWFUL CRIME.

Charged by a Young Man Against His Stepmother.

QUEBEC, Que., March 7.—The inquest in the Fortin poisoning case was continued before Coroner Belletan at the St. Roch police station this morning. Jules Ernest Fortin, son of deceased, was the only witness heard. His deposition does not vary from his declaration before the coronary of the Superior Court. He described the scene he witnessed at the bedside of his father when the latter was in the hours of death, how his stepmother paused on entering the room where her husband was while the notary was making ready to register the man's will, and how Mrs. Fortin found her way into the room when the notary had gone in quest of pen and ink.

She crept alongside, said the witness, and in a tender voice said to her husband: "They are making you tired, my dear; it is too bad of these people. Won't you take a refreshing drink, darling?" Then she brought a glass, and just before presenting it to her husband's lips she poured in the contents of a phial she drew from her pocket. The fluid had a brownish color. Immediately after the drink the poor man complained of a burning sensation in the stomach. Witness asked the woman what she had given his father, but she answered evasively and ran away. Coroner Belletan signed the warrant for the arrest of the woman Fortin.

THE DAIRYMEN
