Collapse of a Rapid Transit Tunnel.

Many Workmen Imprisoned-Several Dead Bodies Taken Out-Forty Men Endangered - Buried

125 Feet Deep. New York, Oct. 18 .- Fifty tons of rock caved in in the Rapid Transit Tunnel at 167th street and Broadway today, carrying death to an undetermined number of the 40 men who were at work far down below the surface
