Then, when Mrs. Willingham came in and said it was time to get dinner, Kate rose in her wrath and drove Mrs. Willingham out of the house.

"I'm the boss," said Kate. Then she put on the beef to roast and sat down and drank some more. Mrs. Willingham went to her room and stayed there. The other members of the family stayed away from the kitchen. Then Mrs. Willingham came home from his office. He smelled burning meat and went to the kitchen to see about it. Kate was asleep, but she woke up and drove him out.

TYPHOON IN LUZON

Town of Baler Wiped Out—20 Dead in Manila Bay—

Great Damage Done—Lively Engagement
at Bangajon.

Manila, Oct. 18.—The worst typhoon
in ten years has been raging for the
past few days. Its center has been
about 60 miles from Manila. Eight miles
of railroad have been destroyed and
half of North and Central Luzon has
been submerged. A majority of the tel-
egraph lines have been damaged, and
government and other vessels have suf-
fered. Twenty persons have been killed
in Manila Bay. The town of Baler has
been demolished.

Five hundred boleros attacked a de-
tachment of 46 men of the 9th Infantry
at Bangajon, on the Gandara River,
Island of Samar, today, killing ten and
wounding six. The remainder of the

to prevent further slaughter and routed
the enemy, killing a hundred of them.
