**ALBINISM IN BIRD WORLD
NOT AN INFREQUENT THING**
Cases of Partial Whiteness Are
Quite Numerous.
Instances of Total Albinism Always
Interest Scientists.

Readers of The Advertiser will re-
member Mr. Richard Lucas' find of
two white robins last week, a case
which has excited considerable inter-
est among local and other ornitholo-
gists. This morning an Advertiser re-
presentative called on Mr. W. E. Sam-
uels, whose interest in ornithology is
well known, to ascertain if white robins
were a rarity, or the reverse, and if
he had come across many specimens
in his ornithological researches.

"I have very often encountered sim-
ilar cases," said Mr. Samuels. "Al-
binism among birds is very common.
It is rarely, indeed, that a pure white
bird is met with, but partial albinism
is seen almost every day. You might
say that partial albinism occurs ten
times where complete albinism oc-
curs only once.
"Albinism are more common among
English sparrows than any other bird,
and almost all sparrows have more or
less white in them.
"One or two ornithologists in North
America pay special attention to albi-
nism, and have large collections of
white birds. Their researches have proved
that this phase of coloring occurs in
every family of birds.
"Another abnormal color occurs once
in a while, though very much more
rarely than albinism, and that is me-
lanism. In melanism the plumage is
all black, instead of all white, but so
rare is it that very few people ever
see a specimen of it. The same thing
occurs in insects once in a while.
"Personally, I do not recall ever hav-
ing seen an instance of melanism,
though I have seen several cases of al-
binism. I remember having seen two
burn swallows that were pure
white, and another time I saw a pure
white pine grosbeak at Rat Portage.
"Besides these two birds of Mr. Lu-
cas', the parents of which, by the way,
were of perfectly normal color, I re-
member another interesting case of al-
binism in London about two years ago.
Someone came and told me that
there was a white robin breeding out-
side the sixth concession, east of Ade-
laide street. I went out to see it, and
every one of the family was of normal
color, with not a trace of the white
plumage or pink eyes of the mother-
bird.
"I am all, like Mr. Lucas, notice
such abnormalities in bird, plant and
animal life, would report their finds to
those interested in natural history.
They would be covering a great favor
upon students of these matters, and
perhaps be giving valuable aid to the
cause of science."
