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MILLIONS NEEDED TO FEED BELGIANS FOR THE COMING WINTER

The Harvest Is Fair, But Not Enough To Go Around.

DAILY MEAL FOR SCHOOLS

Children of Northern France Must Be Looked After by Public.

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, Aug. 28.—The arrival of the harvest materially affects the whole question of relief to the civil population of the Central Empire for the forthcoming year, and the position may be now summarized as follows:

It is stated on good authority that the population of Poland has diminished by about 50 per cent as the result of migration into Russia and starvation during the past winter. The remaining population has, however, together with the German soldiers produced a considerable harvest, and it is considered by the German and Austrian authorities that the local production is ample not only to support the civil population, but to permit some export to Germany and Austria. Much the same situation exists in Serbia, and, therefore, while there may be some shortage in meat, fats and milk, the population in Poland and Serbia can after the harvest be sufficiently provided for out of their own production.

Belgium's Harvest Fair.

"Belgium has a fair harvest which, by agreement between the relief commission and the German authorities, is left entirely to the civil population. On the other hand, the Belgian local production, even in normal times, amounts to only about one-third of the requirements of the population, and, therefore, Belgium must be before met continue on a large scale."

"In the occupied area of Northern France, the mobilization and migration of the male population has made it impossible for the peasants to secure a full productivity of the land, and a large portion of the area has been cultivated by the German army. Negotiations are in progress between the relief commission and the German authorities as to the proportion of the harvest to be set aside for the civil population. In any event the harvest is entirely insufficient, and the total absence of meat, fats and milk supplies makes necessary the continuation of relief on a large scale in order to maintain the French population of 2,500,000 people, of whom 600,000 are children."

Food for Children.

"It is estimated by the commission that, when taking into account the population in Belgium and Northern France, they will need to continue the importation of a minimum of \$12,500,000 a month of foodstuffs during the forthcoming year. It is understood that the subsidies provided by the Allied governments, which amount to in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000 per month, therefore, dependent on public subscription in the neighborhood of \$2,500,000 a month. The commission has just arranged to provide an extra meal for the whole of the school children in Belgium and Northern France, to be given in the schools during the forthcoming year, as investigation has been made of the adolescent children are being insufficiently fed, and the cost of this extra school meal will be approximately \$1,000,000 a month, which increase in the budget of the commission must be found through public charity."
