PUBLIC UTILITIES WILL DELAY 1922 ESTIMATES

Commission Refuses to Fall in With Other Civic Bodies.

Although advocated by certain members of the city council within the past few weeks, the public utilities commission will not prepare "operating" estimates for 1922 until February, next, as in former years.

It has been urged that all spending bodies of the city outline their possible expenditures for the coming year, to be used only as a form of guidance for the new city council or board of education.

It is definitely decided, however, that this procedure shall not be undertaken by the utilities commission, at any rate. Estimates that are to be included in the City of London bill and subsequently approved of by the people have already been prepared and submitted.

It was pointed out that new adherents would not feel inclined to accept responsibilities for undertakings proposed by the preceding council, and that as a result much dissatisfaction would result.

These ballots must be returned to the secretary at once, as they will be counted tonight.

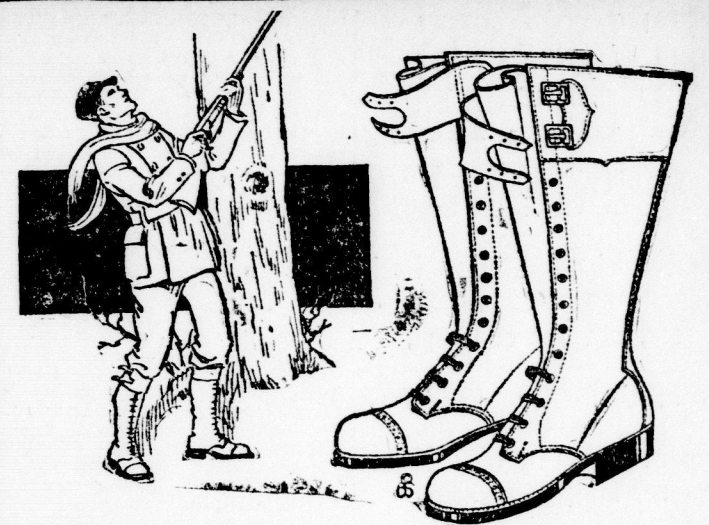
A by-mail ballot is being taken in the primary elections, and all necessary papers and information have been furnished to the members.

CONTROL LAYOUTS IN 5-MILE RADIUS

Town Planning Commission
To Decide On New Sub-
division Locations.

The London Town Planning Commission is going to control the layout of any new subdivisions opened up in the city or anywhere within a radius of five miles of the city.

This was decided upon Thursday night, when the commission passed a resolution asking No. 2 committee to refer any subdivision plans to them for consideration before approval was given. The law which authorized the formation of the commission, gave it power to reach out into the country five miles from the city's border. The commissioners expressed the opinion that if this was done, they would be able to secure better laid-out sections than those of the past.

City Engineer Brazier, who is also the engineer of the commission, was asked to prepare a plan showing the area surrounding the city within the five-mile radius, and to mark thereon all the subdivisions so far laid out, and which have been approved. The engineer reported that he was making good progress with the new map which he is getting out and also that the survey that is being made is progressing nicely.

The matter of the Toronto convention was touched on briefly. The members of the commission had no matters of importance which they wished Chairman T. J. Murphy or Aid. F. E. Harley, the local delegates to bring up. Mr. Murphy will, however, make a report to the convention on the work which the London commission has achieved so far and outline the hopes for the future.

FIRE LOSSES ON DECREASE. Toronto, Oct. 28.—Fire losses in Canada during the week ended Oct. 25 are estimated by the Monetary Times at \$443,800, compared with \$509,750 the previous week.

LOCKING THE DOOR AFTER THE HORSE IS STOLEN

New York Postal Employees Armed After Recent Robbery.

New York, Oct. 28.—A consignment of firearms that lay unused in the New York postoffice, when automobile bandits held up and robbed a lone, unarmed mail truck driver of \$1,454.129 last Monday night, were out today doing duty on the persons of guards who accompanied similar treasure trucks through the city's streets.

One of the first things Postmaster-General Hays discovered when he arrived here yesterday to take charge of the investigation of the robbery, was that a large shipment of guns sent to arm New York postal employees, after a series of mail robberies in other cities, were still in their shipping cases. He ordered them unpacked and put to work. He also ordered an investigation to determine who had been responsible for their non-delivery to employees. Postoffice inspectors, increased in number to fifteen after Mr. Hays' arrival, were bending every energy to unravel the tangled maze of clues leading to the hold-up men and recapture their rich haul before they could dispose of it. Aided by scores of city detectives, the inspectors were rapidly sifting the case down to its essentials.

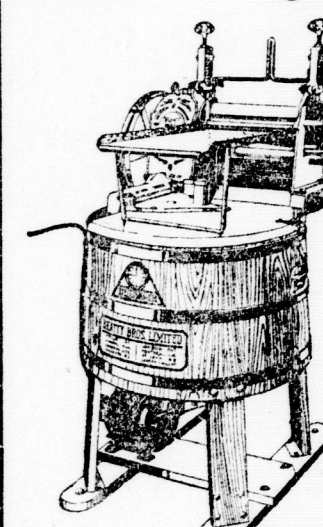

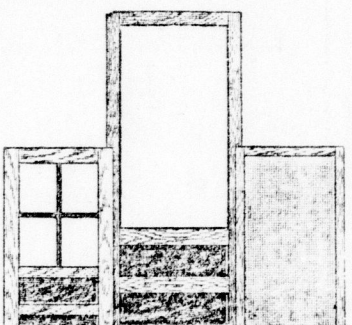
