## HUNT FIFTH BANDIT IN WYOMING ROBBERY

### DOUBTS SOVIET RULE IN RUSSIA NEAR COLLAPSE

Allied Observer Sure Bolsheviks Will Retain Power For Ten Years.

### BATTLE LOOMS AT HAGUE Litvinoff Unlikely To Adopt Conciliatory Attitude at Parley.

The Hague, June 27.—Soviet Russia will have its first tussle with the representatives of Western Europe at The Hague conference this afternoon, when M. Litvinoff and his associates meet with the sub-commission of credits.

The Associated Press has obtained a copy of a private report on Russia which will be distributed to the chiefs of the delegations from non-Russian countries.

This report embodies the view of a prominent and competent European observer of Liberal tendencies, who recently came from Russia, after making a thorough investigation of the political conditions there. The report contains ten paragraphs, remarkable for its brevity. The name of the investigator is withheld by agreement.

The "ten points" follow:

First, barring unforeseen events, the soviet regime is not near collapse, their most ardent adversaries the Socialists, think they may continue in power for another ten years.

Second, the economic exhaustion of Russia is complete, and admitted by the soviet. All power of purchase has disappeared.

Internal Strife Begun.

Third, the soviets are divided among themselves, and internal struggles have begun.

Fourth, hatred of the old regime is general among the people.

Fifth, blockade and foreign military aggression have maintained the soviets in power, but resumption of contact with Europe will destroy them and accelerate their evolution in the direction of conservatism.

Sixth, the soviets recognize without hesitation that only the foreigner can reconstruct Russia.

Seventh, for the moment the intransigent faction of the soviets triumphs.

Eighth, Litvinoff does not arrive with conciliatory intentions.

Ninth, the Russian Socialists would adhere immediately to sovietism if they could obtain the right to vote, the secret vote and liberty of speech and the press. But the Socialists are inclined to refuse the franchise to the bourgeoisie.

Tenth, the blockade and foreign military interventions have developed very powerful nationalism and xenophobia in Russia.

"The world," says the report, "must keep these facts in mind."

### POLICE FIRE ON BERLIN CROWDS

Berlin, June 27.—One man is reported to have been killed and ten others wounded in disturbances which followed a big demonstration in Hamburg last night over the assassination of Foreign Minister Rathenau.

While the crowds were dispersing they found fully armed police standing at strategic points, and understood to be under orders to shoot anyone who loitered. The disturbances followed, and at one point where the demonstrators refused to move the police fired.

### HON. P. C. LARKIN IS NOT RESIGNING

LONDON, June 27.—Canadian Press.—Hon. P. C. Larkin says the rumor that he may resign as Canadian high commissioner is preposterous.

Dispatches have been sent out of Ottawa to the effect that Hon. Mr. Larkin had intimated to Premier Mackenzie King that he would resign the high commissionership within the next month and return to Canada, as he was out of sympathy with the immigration policy of the Dominion government. Mr. Larkin entered upon his duties as Canadian high commissioner on April 1 last.

### Invade Insurance Field In Ontario

ANNOUNCEMENT is made of the election of T. W. McFarland, president of the D. S. Perin Company, this city, to the board of directors of the Commonwealth Life and Accident Insurance Company, a new organization with an authorized capital of \$2,000,000, which was organized in Hamilton Monday.

William Wardrop, K.C., of Hamilton, was elected president of the company, while the vice-presidents are George Boppley, Geo. J. Guy and William Hunter, all of Hamilton. Other directors of the company are J. P. Whalen of Hamilton, and Charles J. Parker of Brantford.

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## Warns Erin Internal Strife Must Cease

### LOYD GEORGE IMPATIENT AS TERROR REIGNS

Intimates Britain Will Act If Dublin Cannot Restore Order.

### WINS CONFIDENCE VOTE

Provincial Government Jails Director of Boycott Against Belfast.

LONDON, June 27.—Premier Lloyd George has at last lost patience with the tide of lawlessness and bloodshed which is sweeping the Emerald Isle, and as a result a stern warning has been sent by the British cabinet to Dublin, intimating that unless prompt measures are taken by the provisional government to allay at once the unrest and rebellion there, the British government will be compelled to resort to armed force to restore order on Irish soil.

Assailed on all sides by enemies of the coalition, who eagerly seized upon the assassination of Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson as a means of attack, the prime minister and Colonial Secretary Winston Churchill have, apparently, however, again stemmed the tide of defeat.

A virtual vote of confidence was given by the House of Commons last night when it defeated, 342 to 75, a motion proposed by the "die hards" for a reduction in the salary of the chief secretary for Ireland in disapproval of the government's policy and failure properly to protect Field Marshal Wilson.

### Capt. George Ullster.

The secretary for the colonies made it clear in his statement that Southern Ireland would not be allowed to coerce Ulster, and that the provisional government in Dublin now must assert complete authority, the alternative being that the imperial government would resume complete freedom of action.

The prime minister, again outlining the policy toward Ireland, said the elections had shown that the provisional government had the Irish people behind it, and that it now must prove whether it was fit to govern.

Mr. Churchill's warning has met with widespread approval, the majority of the newspapers this morning declaring the country will endorse the line the government has taken.

### CAPTURE COMMANDANT.

Dublin, June 27.—Commandant Henderson, director of the boycott against Belfast goods, has been arrested by the provincial government authorities, and removed to Mountjoy Prison, says an announcement issued by the headquarters of the army dissidents in the Four Courts.

Counter action has been taken by the Four Courts irregulars. Last evening they captured Lieut.-Gen. O'Connor, assistant chief of staff of the regulars at Beggar's Bush, and are holding him prisoner.

The executive officers of the irregulars at the Four Courts telephoned the Beggar's Bush officials that Lieut.-Gen. O'Connor was being held as a hostage for the release of the regulars, and of the irregulars, recently arrested at Drogheda.

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### Observe Golden Rule When Touring Canada By Auto

MOTORISTS in Western Ontario who have come to rely on their own devices for shelter and food when touring are keenly aware of the importance of suitable camping places.

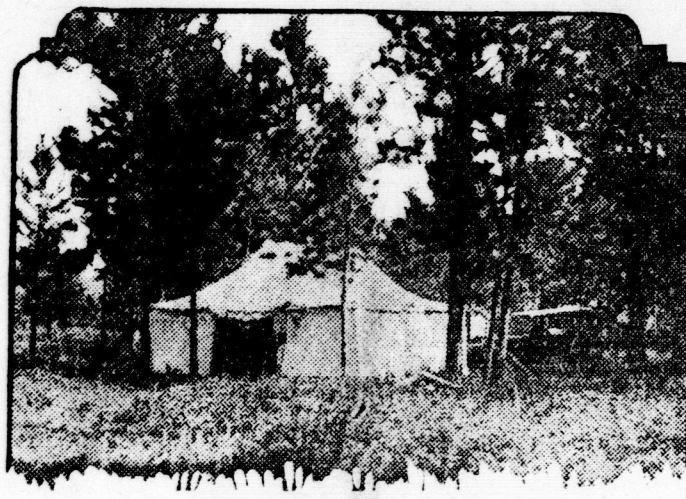
To insure a maximum of comfort and convenience, the camping site should be high, dry and preferably located on a gently sloping hillside to permit of proper drainage in the event of a sudden deluge. The site should be partially shaded, but not so densely wooded as to shut off cooling breezes.

The proximity of pure water is absolutely essential as much of the pleasure of camping may be marred by the necessity for carrying water for long distances across rough ground.

Since many campers do their outdoor cooking on gasoline or kerosene stoves, the need for firewood is not always acute. Nevertheless, a camp fire is often desirable, if only to keep off mosquitoes and provide light.

In starting the camp fire it is best to scrape away dead leaves and mold, as the latter may smolder for days and come to sudden life in a windstorm, possibly causing great damage.

Every camper should try to observe the Golden Rule to the extent of leaving the camp site clean and above all, avoid all possibility of starting forest fires by thoroughly extinguishing camp fires and using up before departure, and even in great care with matches and other places far from human habitation inflammable substances.

### TAKE EXCEPTION TO LIQUOR CHANGE

Ottawa, June 27.—(Canadian Press).—The House of Commons this morning refused to accept the Senate amendment, made by the Senate to the Canada Temperance Act. The chief amendment to which exception was taken was that which prohibited private importation of liquor into the province of British Columbia. L. J. Ladner spoke in support of the motion of Hon. D. R. McKenzie to reject the Senate amendments, and it was carried without dissent. The house accepted the amendments made by the Senate to six other bills.

### JAILS FOUR ON WAY TO RACES

C. P. R. Constable May Face Action For False Arrest in City.

Deprives Carload of Horses of Guardians On Way to Windsor.

Indignant at treatment accorded them by a C. P. R. constable, David Tomlinson, race horse owner; William Ryan and Richard Smith, jockeys, and Arthur Taylor, a Londoner, are in cells at the city police station charged with trespassing on the railroad.

Meanwhile a carload of race horses is on its way to Windsor, with no one in charge of it.

According to Tomlinson, he came from Toronto with the car, in which were some of his own horses and some owned by a man named Stewart. When he arrived in London the two jockeys and Taylor, who had been instructed to meet him in London, arrived from Windsor. Tomlinson had just finished feeding the animals Tuesday morning and had left the car when he and his jockey, Stewart's jockey and their helper, Taylor, were arrested.

The men claim they were not asked for an explanation by C. P. R. Constable Weller, who arrested them, but were hurried to the police station.

They have engaged Albert M. Judd to act for them. He is seeking their immediate release. Action for false arrest may follow, it is stated.

### CLAIMS ARREST OF FOUR.

Chatham, June 27.—According to County Police Chief Peters, word was received from Windsor that four suspects had been arrested in connection with the series of holdups in Kent County reported Sunday evening, and one of the victims of the four masked gunmen, a Mr. Wilcox, was sent to the border early Tuesday morning to try to identify them.

### DENIES WINDSOR ARRESTS.

Windsor, June 27.—Inspector of Detectives William Reid at noon Tuesday denied that the border authorities had made any arrests in connection with the recent robberies in Kent County. No man by the name of Wilcox was arrested.

### Canadian Clubs to Celebrate Dominion Day In Park

MILITARY TO ASSIST.

MEN'S and Women's Canadian Clubs of the city are to combine in an official celebration of Dominion Day, to be held in Victoria Park Saturday morning, July 1, and marked with an impressive military display and community singing.

The Dominion Day celebration was inaugurated last year as a public ceremony by the combined Canadian Clubs, and at a joint meeting in the public library Monday afternoon it was decided to continue the happy precedent and mark another milestone in national progress by a fitting demonstration.

Speakers of prominence are to be secured, and civic officials will take part in the ceremonies. General King, D.O.C., who was present at the meeting, has promised the full co-operation of the officers and men at Wolseley Barracks.

The celebration will be brief, lasting only from 11 to 12 o'clock, but it is to include the impressive "feu de joie" and the royal salute of 21 guns, used only to mark events of national importance. The Royal Canadian Regiment will parade, and the men of the 12th Battery, under Major Kenneth Ingram, as well as a detachment of the First Hussars, and it is expected that the Boy Scouts, Boys' Naval Brigade and the Girl Guides will each have a share in the ceremonial.

Community singing will augment the military display. Dominion Day is of a purely Canadian character, and the Canadian national songs, with "God Save the King," will form the program.

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### JAIL TWO SUSPECTS AS KENT COUNTY THUGS AT BRANTFORD

Provincial Police in London Believe "Robbery" Car Was in Downtown Area of City On Saturday.

Believing that the four masked gunmen who were responsible for three robberies along the highways of Kent County Sunday night were Londoners, provincial police are still continuing their investigations in the city and district, and arrests are momentarily anticipated.

Members of the provincial squad informed The London Advertiser Tuesday that Saturday afternoon last they could not avoid noting four young men in a Cadillac machine, such as described by the Kent County authorities, driving about the downtown area, frequently stopping along the curb in prominent places.

The officers explain that their suspicions were instantly aroused by the action and general appearance of the men, and although they had no valid reason for interfering with them at the time, they state that they were not at all surprised when the news of the hold-ups west of London reached them late Monday afternoon.

The identity of all four men in the car in question is known, the police state, and while none of them have been seen in the neighborhood since Saturday, their descriptions and names have been wired in all directions from the city.

All four are said to be local residents.

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### WILL VOTE ON NEW BRIDGE FOR SOUTH LONDON

Ratepayers To Decide On Question at Next Election.

### MAYOR FAVORS PLAN

Brazier Will Close Old Traction Structure to Pedestrians.

Ratepayers of London will likely be called upon to vote on a bylaw authorizing construction of a bridge connecting Richmond street with South London at the next civic election, according to Mayor Cameron Wilson and Ald. J. T. May.

While the "Traction" Company bridge, which was acquired by the city, serves pedestrian traffic across the River Thames at this point, City Engineer Brazier announced Tuesday that this bridge will be closed in the near future, as it is becoming unsafe.

"I am going to bring up the question of a new bridge across the river at Richmond street south before the city council," declared Ald. May, who represents South London on the city council. "It will then be put to a vote of the ratepayers at the next civic election."

Bridge Badly Needed.

"Some years ago a bylaw to construct a bridge at this point was defeated by the ratepayers. It is badly needed, and opens up a residential district, which is rapidly growing."

Mayor Wilson has declared himself to be in favor of this proposed bridge, but doubts if it will carry on a vote of the people, in view of the fact that it serves but one portion of the city. He points out that Richmond street is one of the main thoroughfares, and should have a bridge connecting it with South London.

"It is bound to come," he informed The Advertiser. "But it is difficult to obtain a favorable vote of the people on a thing like that, because it is local, and the citizens take the view that it affects only the district which it serves."

With Ald. May.

"However, I am with Ald. May on this thing, and will support it when brought up before the city council. It will be submitted to the ratepayers at the next civic election."

In all probability the property owners will also be permitted to vote upon the question of a new city hall, and the feasibility of the present site for the new building at the election next December.

Declaring that the old Traction Company bridge, which crosses the River Thames between Clarence and Richmond streets to Carfax Crescent, will be closed to traffic, Ald. May turned to Page 2, Column 1.

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### CLAIMS COMMUNIST PLOT TO KILL PREMIER POINCARÉ

Leon Daudet Causes Uproar in the French Chamber by Assertions.

Paris, June 27.—Accusing the communists of plotting the assassination of Premier Poincaré, and demanding that a law be passed immediately authorizing the minister of justice to place the most violent members of the communist party under arrest, Leon Daudet, socialist member of the parliament, caused an uproar in the chamber yesterday afternoon. The debate developed into invectives against the premier from the communist benches, in which the cry, "Poincaré means war!" was flung at Poincaré by Deputy Ernest Laffont.

Springing from his seat and pointing a warning finger at Laffont, Premier Poincaré shouted indignantly: "Do you take the responsibility for that remark?"

Laffont retorted something about "explaining the charge before public opinion."

### NATIONAL COUNCIL URGES REFORMS

Seeks Legislation Compelling Production of Health Certificate Before Marriage.

Fort William, June 27.—Following the election of Mrs. C. E. Carmichael of New Glasgow, N. S., provincial vice-president for Nova Scotia, as president, the convention of the National Council of Women passed a resolution yesterday urging that the certificates of health be issued previous to marriage. The social hygiene movement introduced by the council, it is hoped, will do much toward ameliorating conditions, and in time make health certificates possible.

"The talented woman has been legislated against, but what of the woman who has become a lifelong sufferer after marriage?" asked Mrs. Torrington in her address. She stressed the necessity of a "social clean-up." The council also endorsed proposals for the mental inspection of schools, classes for sub-normal children, inspection of mental hospitals, commitment to mental hospitals through psychiatric clinics wherever possible, remedial punishment for crime, qualification of women physicians, psychiatrists, and discontinuance of annual examinations in schools where the vitality of both teachers and pupils is at the lowest ebb.

### SEEK HELP FOR LUMBER CAMPS

Victoria, B. C., June 27.—Unemployment in the lumber industry has not only decreased to the vanishing point, but there is already an acute shortage of skilled and semi-skilled labor in the industry, according to the British Columbia Loggers' Association, who have made application to the Dominion Employment Service to import 300 lumbermen from Eastern Canada so that the industry can be carried on at the pace that the demand warrants. More than 15,000 men are now employed in the lumber industry of British Columbia.
