The feature of the report presented to the board of education by Marcus M. Sims, attendance officer for the city schools, was that in the part-time classes for September but one case of absence was reported. This was considered an indication of the manner in which students and their parents are taking to the adolescen

The report in full is as follows:

"During the month reports have been received from the various schools of those pupils who have been absent, and those who have not registered. These have received attention, with the result that the attendance in the schools is well up to standard, and very few cases of actual truancy are being reported.

Investigate Absences.

"A definite plan is now in operation with the attendance department, provides that each case of absence is investigated and reported thereon. This plan was first put into effect with one school at the commencement of the term, with the result that there has been a very large decrease of absence in that school.

"During the month the census cards

were sent out to the various schools to be checked with the school regis-ters. In con-nection with this a form of monthly report has been put into effect with the schools which will permit the keeping of a continual accurate record of the pupils in each school, thereby making it unnecessary to thereby making it unnecessary to send out the cards for a rechecking
