OFFICER STATES LITTLE TRUANCY PREVAILS IN CITY

Attendance Official Declares Registration at Schools Is Well Up To Standard.

CHECK CENSUS CARDS

The feature of the report presented to the board of education by Marcus M. Sims, attendance officer for the city schools, was that in the part-time classes for September but one case of absence was reported. This was considered an indication of the manner in which students and their parents are taking to the adolescent act.

The report in full is as follows: "During the month reports have been received from the various schools of those pupils who have been absent, and those who have not registered. These have received attention, with the result that the attendance in the schools is well up to standard, and very few cases of actual truancy are being reported.

"Investigate Absences." "A definite plan is now in operation whereby each school, in co-operation with the attendance department, provides that each case of absence is investigated and reported thereon. This plan was first put into effect with one school at the commencement of the term, with the result that there has been a very large decrease of absences in that school. A slight modification of the plan permitted its use throughout all schools.

"During the month the census cards were sent out to the various schools to be checked with the school registers. These have now all been returned to the office, where they are receiving a final checking, which will indicate those pupils who have not as yet registered at any school. In connection with this a form of monthly report has been put into effect with the schools which will permit the keeping of a continual accurate record of the pupils in each school, thereby making it unnecessary to send out the cards for a rechecking each year.

"Meet No Difficulties." "No difficulties have been met in the application of the adolescent act. Co-operation is being maintained with employers of adolescents. The part-time classes are working out very successfully, only one case of

Fifty-Five Seek Job of Janitor

Receive Many Applications for Position in the Trafalgar School.

That the position as janitor in the city schools is much sought after is evidenced by the fact that 55 applications have been received in connection with the janitorship of Trafalgar school, although the building will not be completed for another month.

The applications have been coming in for many weeks until Capt. W. Robinson, superintendent of works, now thinks that he is going to have "some job" picking out the right man. ALLEGED THIEF CAUGHT IN FRENCH VILLAGE

Associated Press Despatch. Paris, Oct. 5.—Gabriel Alphonse Mourey, wanted for the theft of jewels valued at \$90,000, from the home of Albert S. Shattuck in New York City, had spent several months at Chelles, 12 miles from Paris, where he was captured yesterday.

Mourey, it is learned, passed his time feigning to be the proprietor of a small restaurant at Chelles during the last five months, posing as a well-to-do carpenter. He had taken every possible precaution to avoid identification, having shaved his beard, taken out the gold fillings in two teeth in his upper jaw, and removed the tattoo marks from his hand. He is said to have been present at his father's funeral disguised as a woman.

Mourey was wounded in his fight with the police, but will probably be arraigned on a charge of attempted murder, inasmuch as he shot a French policeman at the time of his capture.

LORD RENFREW WALKS STREETS UNRECOGNIZED

Hears the Complaints of Disgruntled Harvesters in Winnipeg Hotel Suite.

CHEERED BY CROWDS

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 5.—Lord Renfrew is on his way through Ontario. His brief visit in Winnipeg ended this afternoon. Only a few people saw his train pull out, as the general public was not admitted to the platform, but it took 24 city and C. P. R. police to hold back the hundreds of people who surged toward him as he walked from the hotel to the station. Lord Renfrew spent the day very quietly. He did not leave his suite until nearly noon. Then he was driven to the Winnipeg Squash Racquets Club and had several games. After lunch he went shopping, and his income certainly held good on Winnipeg streets. In Calgary it had been shattered by hotel guests, who followed him from store to store. But at Chelles, 12 miles from Paris, where he was captured yesterday, he seemed to recognize him. A young newsie spied him from across the street and started after him, but after following him for half a block returned to his corner.

Harvesters Complain. When Lord Renfrew arrived in Winnipeg, a gang of unemployed harvesters had paraded to meet him, but they failed to connect. They wanted Lord Renfrew to listen to their grievance. They said they were a most unkind fate here. They had come to Canada to be harvesters, only to fall into the ranks of the unemployed. Something should be done about it, they said. They thought the best solution would be a general distribution of the government of tickets back to the British Isles, or if not that a guarantee of work. Lord Renfrew agreed to meet their representatives and made an appointment for the afternoon.

SUPERVISORS REPORT UPON MONTH'S WORK

September Busy Period for Various Departments of Public Schools.

September was a busy month for the various departments of the public schools, according to a report of Chief Inspector V. K. Greer. The report, which was quite lengthy, was presented at the meeting of the board of education yesterday afternoon.

Among the items in it were the reports of the supervisors of school nurses reported 3,768 inspections; supervisor of art, 183 visits and 82 lessons taught; supervisor of music, 141 classes visited. The chief dental inspector reported that operations at the central clinic totaled 867, while examinations at the prophylactic clinic amounted to 691.

The enrolments in the manual training and household science classes totalled 1,250 and 1,388, respectively, with an average attendance of 1,150 and 1,281.
