THE RISING IN IRELAND.
THE MARQUIS OF WATERFORD PUR-
SUED BY A MOB.

arming Extent of the List of Agrarian Out-
rages for September—Foster and Parsons—The
Militia to be attacked.

New York, Oct. 12.—The Telegraph's
specials declare the Marquis of Water-
ford a league has been organized to
prevent hunting throughout Ireland.
He was out hunting last Thursday,
the hounds were blown, and a large
multitude of people gathered and
stoned him and his friends. They
pelted dogs, stabled several with pit-
chforks, and hooted and yelled till they
obliged the party to go home.

King Sullivan was
arrested for putting needles into potatoes
he was giving to the cattle of boobyland
farmers. It is reported one hundred papers
of needles were sprinkled in the hay to
cattle at Tipperary.

The police report of agrarian outrages for
September shows 1 murder in Clara, 1
maulage in Cork, 4 cases of attempted
murder, 15 cases of aggravated assault, (2
of which were fatal), 1 case of cutting
and maiming the person, 24 incendiary
cases, 4 burglaries and robberies, 7 taking
and holding forcible possession, 11 cutting
away the arms and scabbars, 15 robbery
cases, 5 riots and affrays, and 2 of in-
terfering unlawfully with the law.

There were 233
cases of kidnapping, 1 case of threatening
letters, 44 miscellaneous, 1 case of attack-
ing a house, 48 of injury to property, 7 of
firing into dwellings and 1 of obstruction to
railway traffic. Total offences 387. The
hull list with 53, Rescomman and
Clare each 23, Kerry 27, Galway 25, Lec-
trin 21, Mayo 20, Limerick 19, Monaghan,
Kilkenny and Westmeath 15 each.

It is asserted Foster said a few days ago

THE THOROLD OUTRAGE.
John Riley Turns Queen's Evidence Against His
Associates in Crime.

St. Catharines, Oct. 12.—At the assize
court today John Riley was arraigned on
charges of rape and pleaded guilty. The
crime was committed in Merriton in May
last from the effects of which the vic-
tim, a young girl, died. Riley, who had
been appointed deputy post-master-general.
The principal witness against the prisoner
Riley being forced to participate
in the crime by the others for the purpose
of preventing him from informing on them.
Richard Howell, one of the four parties
mentioned above, was next arraigned.
The principal witness against him was
John Riley, who gave the particulars
of the outrage.

It will be remembered that the outrage
in question was one of uncommon brutality.
The girl Porter, who was run down to a
very low state of sickness and was
brutally maltreated. She was afterwards
sent to St. Catharines hospital, where she
died in a few days. Riley, one of the par-
ticipants in the outrage, will be the chief
witness against the others.

London is to have a new police station;
the one now in use being a free-breeding
establishment.

The body of an unknown man was found
in the Ottawa river yesterday at Bryson,
with \$50 in his pockets.

A batch of convicts from the St. Vincent
Island penitentiary were sent to the
Kingston penitentiary yesterday.

The case of Broadfield v. Symes at
Halifax is ended. Symes has been found
guilty of fraud and was remanded to prison
for nine months.

At Ottawa yesterday afternoon Mr. Allan
Gilmour, jr. was united in marriage to Miss
Bertha Ross, niece of Judge Ross. Rev. D.
A. Gordon officiated.

Thaddeus Lyons, who fell into a collar
in the plumbing establishment, and fractured
his skull, died in Montreal yesterday
afternoon.

At Montreal yesterday, the son of Leon
Gauthier, was run over on the street, and
so severely injured that he died shortly
afterwards.

A by-law granting a bonus of \$24,000
per mile to the Pacific and Pointe-au-Lac
railway has been passed by a majority of 580.
The bill was introduced by the Hon. J. H.
H. Hope who will take the collection of
Montreal, so as to make way for Sir A.
G. Galt, who is said to be desirous of enter-
ing the ministry.

Col. Dennis was not out yesterday; his
illness is said to arise from overwork, and it
is expected that he will be discharged from
his resignation as deputy minister of the
interior.

Members of the syndicate were with the
minister of the interior on Tuesday on land
between the Canadian government and
between the land and other matters. Col.
Dennis, though unwell, was at the office
to assist in the syndicate business.

Richard Howell, who was connected with
the Merriton rape case last spring, was ar-
rested in Thorold on Tuesday by Chief Con-
stable McMahon, and taken to St. Catharines,
where he will receive his trial at the
next assizes.

The anniversary meeting of the Ottawa
Auxiliary of the Women's Missionary Society
was held in St. Andrew's church, Ottawa,
Tuesday afternoon. Reports presented
showed the association to be in a prosperous
condition. The receipts for the year amounted
to \$229, and the branch starts the new
year free of debt. The total membership is
363. A large quantity of religious litera-
ture was distributed during the year and
meets held.

With regard to the emigration scheme for
Ireland, Father Nugent asked the Dominion
minister about the Canadian government give
a land grant equal to the money aid to
be voted by the imperial government and
the \$200,000 capital of the company
which is to be organized. The government
seemed somewhat favorable to a grant of
land for the Irish settlers.
