A New York letter says: "The most costly summer costumes are probably the most little known."

Two hundred yards directly northeast from the imposing soldiers' monument in Calvary cemetery is a gray granite obelisk which daily attracts the attention of visitors.

It is the largest stone in the new portion of the cemetery, and its polished surface rises fifty-two feet from the base.

On the east side of the coping there is an inscription on the arch, sunk deep into the granite and embossed with gold.

The letters read: "ERECTED TO OUTLAST THE BRITISH MONARCHY." Some who read the inscription openly express delight, while others think it is out of place in a graveyard.

On the north side of the obelisk, cut in polished granite and in raised letters, is a mortuary notice which shows that in one of the vaults lies the remains of Eleanor Murphy of Donegal, wife of Daniel Murphy, who died in New York city in 1882, at the age of 82 years.

The obelisk is built of Quincy granite, the finest and most durable in the world. No expense has been spared, and there is no better finished piece of work in any cemetery.

The engraving of the letters is done by hand. Daniel Murphy, who erected the obelisk and caused the inscription to be put upon it, lives in simple style on the north-west corner of Bay Street and New Church streets, this city. He is worth \$200,000, and occupies the first floor of a double apartment house, which he built in 1873, and which he has since enlarged with blindness two years ago, after a severe attack of Bright's disease. He came to this country in 1824, and has since been in New Jersey, receiving \$8 a month and his board.

"The inscription on the coping is my own," he said. "I want the obelisk to outlast the British monarchy. For the government of England I have no respect, and I do not wish to see the obelisk standing as a monument to the British monarchy."

Are Men Growing Older? From a life table that has just appeared in England, it seems that since 1771 the longevity of the English people has sensibly increased. Whether from the operation of the public health act, or from the general attention to health which produced the act, or from an unobtrusive change in the way of the people akin to the development of temperance now going on, or from one of those alterations in the virulence of disease which have repeatedly occurred in history, the mortality from epidemic disease suddenly declined, till the mean mortality in England, which between 1838-54 had been 22.5 per 1000, dropping in 1878-80 to 20.8, and is dropping still, the mean death rate of 1881-82 being only 18.4, a total improvement of very nearly one-seventh.

This increased longevity is not, it is true, equally divided among the sexes. Men live two years longer than they did thirty years ago, and women three years and four months longer, a difference, we need not say, as large as the difference between the sexes in the very old age, but it is not so marked in the younger years. It is, however, in youth and early maturity that the improvement is most marked. The man's chance of life is increased most decidedly between five and one and thirty-five, and the woman's between five and fifty-four.
