- KENEBEC, (Abenakis), for, Kinebek, or Kinebak, large lake, or again, deep river.
- KIWAKUAI SIBO, Cannibal River, a branch of the St-Maurice River. Kiwakua, (Abenakis), man-eater.
- KWANôBAGNAGAK, or Kwanôbagnagasik, (diminutive), is the name given by the Abenakis to a little island owned by them, on the river St-Francis, known under the name of "L'Ile-à-l'Ail." It means: long narrow island.
- Kenosha, probably for: Kwenoza, (Abenakis), pike.
- KWENOSASEK, (Abenakis idiom), means: at the pike river.
- KENTUCKY, likely for, Kwenataga, it is long.
- KOATTEGOK, (Abenakis), local term of koattegw, pine river. See Coaticook.
- MADÔBALODENIK, an idiomatical expression by which the Abenakis designate the city of Three Rivers, after the former name of the River St Maurice, which was: Lodenoi sibo. It was so called, because in old times, when the hunting territories were all devided among the Indians, this river, from its mouth up to a certain distance, belonged to an indian named Lodeno. The expression madôbalodenik, from: madôba***ik, which comes or flows in, and the interposition of loden, an abbreviation of Lodeno, means: the outlet or confluence of the River Lodeno.
