Milesian was the greatest cross-country horse that America ever produced, having beaten all the best horses of his time as can be seen by reference to the Turf Register.

At Long Branch, N. J., Aug. 3, 1872, he won the Grand Hurdle Race, beating Lochiel, Vesuvius, and three others, 2 miles, over eight hurdles, 15½ lbs. up, in 8:52½, the best time on record, full weights up.
