LET ME ALSO TAKE THIS OPPORTUNITY TO CONGRATULATE MR. JEAN N. PICARD, YOUR PRESIDENT-ELECT, AND OFFER HIM MY BEST WISHES AS HE BEGINS HIS TERM OF OFFICE.

I TRUST THAT YOU HAVE BEEN ABLE TO FIND TIME FOR A TOUR OF OUR FINE CITY DURING YOUR STAY HERE.
